Always a highlight of the conferences in the past, NAFIS is bringing back our school district video presentations that illustrate how districts use Impact Aid funding locally. The first one will be from Chamberlain, South Dakota. NAFIS Government Affairs Director Jocelyn Bissonnette will follow with a legislative update so all attendees can begin to focus on their Hill work that will come on Tuesday. After the First General Session, school board members will meet to nominate their candidate to the NAFIS Board of Directors. At 4:45PM, new attendees will have the opportunity to meet with NAFIS staff and leaders at the New to NAFIS Welcome session. The end of the first full conference day will culminate with a Meet and Greet Reception, but just before, former NAFIS Executive Director John Forkenbrock will be signing editions of his new book that chronicles the history of NAFIS through a series of his IMPACT newsletter columns from the 1980s to 2015. Proceeds from the book will be directed to the FISEF's Good Idea Grant program.

Monday, September 26 will begin with a series of NAFIS subgroup breakfasts and meetings, followed at 10:00AM with a series of Breakout Sessions. From the Desk of Executive Director Hilary Goldmann

Reflections on My First Year

It's hard to believe I have already reached the one-year mark as the NAFIS Executive Director; the year has flown. I'm jazzed each day to walk into the NAFIS office to advance the goals of the NAFIS Family. I know you know this, but I must say it anyway: the NAFIS staff are AMAZING; the quality of the work that is accomplished by Jocelyn Bissonnette, Bryan Jernigan and Lynn Watkins is truly outstanding.

As my first year coincides with the NAFIS membership year, I will use this column to reflect upon the last year, both personally and organizationally. For me professionally, this year has been extremely rewarding. This was my first opportunity to lead an organization. Of course I am still learning, but I have thoroughly enjoyed the new responsibilities, and take pride that the transition has been relatively seamless and that we have not missed a beat on the Hill. I am proud of this past year's achievements and look forward to embracing new opportunities and overcoming challenges as they arise in the years ahead.

There have been many highlights and memorable moments this year; what they all have in common is being a part of the NAFIS Family. I've had the tremendous opportunity to tour NAFIS member school districts near Indian Lands, military installations and Federal property. I toured Browning School District in Montana, San Carlos Unified School District in Arizona, Highland Falls-Ft. Montgomery School District in New York and Central Union School District in California. I was able to see Federal impactation firsthand and Impact Aid dollars at work, making me a better advocate for the Impact Aid program. The most special part of these visits were the faces of the students engaged in learning, and conversations with dedicated professionals leading the efforts to support all of their students to reach their potential.

Another highlight of the last year is greeting, meeting and conversing with NAFIS members at the Fall and Spring conferences. The amount of work that goes into planning two national conferences a year is significant, however all of this effort all pays off -- staff learn from you and are re-energized after each conference, the Hill takes notice of your advocacy and commitment to ensuring your school districts have

the resources they deserve. I am looking forward to seeing many of you this fall.

Celebrating our legislative victories was momentous. At the Spring Conference we raised a glass (sparkling cider) and toasted the work of the NAFIS Family. The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) passed with strong bi-partisan support and included almost all of the NAFIS reauthorization recommendations. On the appropriations front, NAFIS was successful in securing a \$17 million increase for Basic Support and saving Federal Properties from elimination. Most recently, the Senate Appropriations



Committee included a \$10 million increase for Impact Aid for FY17, that includes \$2 million for Federal Properties and \$8 million for Basic Support. We have a lot of work to do in the coming months to realize a funding increase for FY 17, but at a time of zero-sum budgeting, receiving an increase in the Senate Committee bill is a significant step.

Some other things we've accomplished over the year include updating the NAFIS public face such as an updated membership brochure and an infographic Annual Report; and we overhauled the Basics of Impact Aid booklet. We continue to use #ImpactAid to spread the word about Impact Aid to the broader community, and the NAFIS Facebook and Twitter presence is growing!

NAFIS held six webinars this year that were highly valued by the NAFIS membership. The webinars provided an opportunity for NAFIS members to stay abreast of breaking policy news and for those mem-

bers who are not able to attend NAFIS conferences it was a way for them to hear information first hand with direct access to policy experts. The webinars were timely and filled with quality information, focusing on the "Budget Deal," the Every Student Succeeds Act; the Impact Aid Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) and an update on FY 17 budget and appropriations. NAFIS will continue to hold webinars throughout the upcoming membership year.

At the close of the calendar year, the Department of Education released an NPRM asking for public comment on a number of changes to the Impact Aid regulations,. NAFIS led a letter signed by 16 national organizations and held a Congressional briefing on the digital count that was co-hosted by Representative Mark Takai and the Software and Information Industry Association. NAFIS will continue to push the Department of Education to modernize the Impact Aid application process and keep you updated about final regulations.

Looking ahead to the 2016-2017 NAFIS membership year, we will experience the biggest political transition in DC since 2008 with a new President and a new Congress. Control of the White House and the House and Senate are up for grabs, and subsequent jockeying for committee chairmanships and committee assignments will play out. Among all of this uncertainty, there is one thing that is certain -- there will be a lot of educating to do on the Hill and with the next Administration. The entire NAFIS Family must be part of that education process! We are stronger in numbers and when we speak with a unified message.

On behalf of myself and the NAFIS staff, we look forward to supporting NAFIS members throughout the next membership year, advancing our policy goals, answering your Impact Aid questions, serving as your liaison with the U.S. Department of Education and so much more. If you have not yet mailed your membership dues, please do so today! Payment Update

Section 8003, FY 2016 Payments -- The Department is currently releasing initial and interim payments set at 75% of LOT and \$1,000 per unit for children with disabilities. As of July 6, over \$923 million had been released to 1,046 applicants. Most eligible districts have received their additional Heavily Impacted payment for FY 2016, with the few remaining to be released as the reviews are completed.

Section 8002 Payments -- As of July 6, the Department has made FY 2016 foundation payments totaling over \$59 million to 187 applicants. The Department released final payments for FY 2013 and adjusted final payments for FY 2012 in June and plans to release final Section 8002 payments for FY 2014 this summer.

Section 8007(a), Formula Construction Payments -- The Department released initial formula construction payments for FY 2016 in early July. If your LEA has at least half of its student membership living on Indian lands, the initial rate is \$100 per Indian Lands (Category C) weighted student unit. If your LEA has at least half of its student membership with a parent in the uniformed services, the initial rate is \$210 per Uniformed Services (Categories B and D(i)) weighted student unit. Construction grant funds can be used for construction-related expenses, or debt service for construction.



DEPARTMENT WATCH

FY 2017 Application Amendments -- The Department is no longer accepting new applications for FY 2017; however, school districts may make changes to their FY 2017 applications until September 30, 2016, using www.G5.gov. If you are having difficulty submitting an amendment, please call the G5 helpdesk at 1-888-336-8930.

FY 2017 Field Reviews -- Certain FY 2017 applicants selected for field reviews received letters this spring requesting the supporting documentation for their applications. Please respond to these requests promptly, and follow up to resolve any issues identified during review to make sure your payment can be processed on time in the fall.

Proposed Changes to Program Regulations -- On December 30, 2015, the De-

partment published proposed (not final) changes to the Impact Aid program regulations in the Federal Register. The Department received 57 comments, all of which are available to view at regulations.gov. All comments are being considered before the Department issues the final regulations. An email will go out over the listserv when the final regulations are published.

Keep ED Updated with your Staff Changes -- Will your Impact Aid contact person change over the summer? You can notify the Department of additional contact persons and staff changes by sending an email to Impact.Aid@ed.gov.

Keep Up Your DUNS Registration in SAM -- To receive funds from any Federal program, your school district must have its DUNS number registered in the System for Award Management (SAM). Your SAM registration must be updated annually. Visit www.sam.gov for more information on keeping your record active.

Your school district's annual membership dues renewal invoice was mailed in mid-May. NAFIS sent a copy to our NAFIS contact, and we also sent a copy to your school district's accounting department. Please have your district renew its dues before the beginning of your school year. Remember, your school district must be "in good standing" to vote at our upcoming NAFIS Fall Conference in September, so getting payment out of the way sooner rather than later can avoid any issues with voting.

And speaking of the NAFIS Fall Conference, the meeting will be here before you know it. It is set for September 25-27, 2016 at the Hyatt Regency Capitol Hill in Washington, DC. On-line registration for both the Hyatt (our host hotel) and the conference are now active under the Meetings tab on the NAFIS website (www.nafisdc.org).

I have noticed that there is a discrepancy between the number of hotel reservations that have been made and the number of conference registrants. Remember, it's a two-step process: 1) registering for the hotel; and 2) registering for the conference. NAFIS Holds Hill Briefing on Digital Count

On April 28, NAFIS co-hosted a Capitol Hill briefing with Congressman Mark Takai (D-HI) and the Software and Information Industry Association (SIIA) for an event called LEAP Forward: Modernizing the Impact Aid Program. There has been a great need to modernize the Impact Aid application process to improve efficiency for school districts. Earlier this year, nearly 87-percent of NAFIS members responded to a survey in support of an electronic student data collection process. In the NAFIS comments to the U.S. Department of Education's Notice of Proposed Rulemaking, NAFIS members were quoted as saying:

- "The survey form is outdated."
- "Today's electronic systems are faster, economical, and more accurate."
- "All of [our] student records are electronic, so this would be a benefit and time saver for the district."

In mid-February, two letters were then sent to the Department of Education Impact Aid office, one on behalf of NAFIS, and another from NAFIS and 15 other national organizations. Their request was for an alternative method to count federally-connected children other than the parent-pupil survey or source check collection tools.

NAFIS Executive Director Hilary Goldmann welcomed everyone to the briefing and addressed a full room that included Congressional staffers and representatives from the Department of Education. Staff from Congressman Takai's office gave opening remarks in support of modernizing the Impact Aid Program. This issue is one the Congressman has been advocating for since his days in the Hawaii state legislature.

Jocelyn Bissonnette, NAFIS Government Affairs Director, led a session on the Impact Aid law, providing a program overview to attendees and examples of Federal impactation. Bissonnette also gave a historical overview of Impact Aid. The presentation continued by discussing the Department of Education's Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM) on ways to digitally count children in federally impacted districts.

Goldmann then led a panel discussion that included NAFIS members and the private sector. The panelists spoke both to the challenge of the current system and opportunities for leveraging their existing student information systems. Panelists included:

- Cherise Imai, Military Liaison, Hawaii Department of Education
- Keith Mispagel, Superintendent, Ft. Leavenworth Unified School District 207

- Mark Schneiderman, Vice President of Government Affairs, SchoolMessenger

With the help of all participants, attendees were well versed on the Impact Aid law and its application process. Overall, this event was a great way to continue an important conversation about modernizing and streamlining the application process.



NAFIS Subgroups Hold Summer Meetings

Federal Lands Impacted Schools Association (FLISA)

On June 25th, the Federal Lands Impacted Schools Association (FLISA) met in Chicago, IL for its annual meeting. Bob Reichert, current FLISA president, began the meeting with introductions and Tom Gregory gave a membership update. FLISA members then voted on approving the minutes from the Spring NAFIS conference. FLISA Executive Director Tom Madden provided a report on the mission and vision of FLISA to members present. He announced that he will be leading a Federal Properties Impact Aid application workshop just prior to the Fall NAFIS conference. Tom also gave an appropriations status update on the Administration's elimination of Federal Properties in the FY 2017 budget request.

The conference then led to an Advocacy Action Plan work session. This session was led by Bob Reichert and focused on what initiatives each committee could work on before the Fall NAFIS conference. Bob then assigned groups to continue working on their respective target areas and focused on topics like how to supervise, monitor and how to motivate.

NAFIS Board President Sandy Doeber and Madden both then led a NAFIS update session. Tom Schneider also provided insight about the Fall NAFIS Conference and how it will have a focus on targeted lobbying as well as an overview of the successful Federal Relations Outreach meeting in April. In regards to the Fall NAFIS Conference, conversation regarding Federal Properties talking points were discussed.

Finally, the meeting closed with discussion regarding issues with the Impact Aid application and payment process. Tom Madden provided logistics for the Winter meeting on January 7, 2017 at Driskill Hotel in Austin, TX. A review of the mission and vision by Bob Reichert closed the meeting.

Madden said, "In addition to the normal and routine matters that need attention at any of our group's meetings, we spent considerable time working on our Advocacy Action Plan, our long range plan for FLISA. Part of that work focused on continued refinements to our newly created website (www.flisa.org). In addition, we began planning our talking points for our Hill visits during the upcoming NAFIS Fall Conference. All in all, it was a very successful meeting."

Military Impacted Schools Association (MISA)

On June 28, The Military Impacted Schools Association (MISA) held its summer meeting in Visalia, CA and was hosted by the Central Union School District. Participants spent Monday, June 27, at the Lemoore Naval Air Station, home to the Pacific Strike Fighter Wing and its supporting facilities.

For the annual business meeting, MISA consultants and invited guests updated the group on a variety of topics. Eric Hill from the Department of Education Impact Aid office gave an overview of Impact Aid payments and mentioned a pilot project on updated the application process. NAFIS Executive Director Hilary Goldmann up-

dated the group on NAFIS activities and current legislation, she highlighted the Department of Education proposed regulation changes and emphasized NAFIS support of a digital student count.

Chick Feldmayer, MISA consultant, then provided an update and timeline of defense force structures and related budgets. The meeting discussed special education challenges, observations of the increasing demands on the budget that special education has caused.

Kate Wren Gavlak, Travis USD, introduced Cherise Imai as the new Executive Director for Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission (MIC3). Cherise outlined some of her goals for compact activities moving forward. Then Kyle Fairbairn, MISA Executive Director, updated attendees about pressing items on the Hill.

The meeting then moved on to discuss Department of Defense (DOD) funding. Mark Gillman briefed members on the outlook for BRAC and DoD Impact Aid funding. The meeting ended with Kyle reminding the group about the summer 2017 meeting being hosted by Camden County Schools and at Amelia Island, GA, June 25-27. Overall, it was a productive and informative meeting.

Appropriations Update

The appropriations process for FY 2017 funding continues to advance. The Senate Appropriations Committee has adopted its Labor-Health and Human Services-Education subcommittee bill with a \$10 million increase for Impact Aid (\$2 million for Federal Properties, \$8 million for Basic Support). Only a handful of education programs received increases, so the prioritization of Impact Aid is a testament to the work of the NAFIS Family. The draft House bill includes a \$23 million increase for Basic Support, despite an overall cut of over \$1 billion to the Department of Education. The community has been hard at work all year advocating for increased funding through the Spring Conference, Federal Relations Outreach meeting, and Action Alert. NAFIS staff have also been busy advocating on your behalf and soliciting support for Impact Aid from other organizations. One example is the Federal Properties letter NAFIS organizes each year in response to the Administration's elimination of the program. This year, 71 organizations signed the letter:

Our School District Stories: Impact Aid Challenges In Their Own Words

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INTRODUCTION

In early 2010, the National Association of Federally Impacted Schools asked its members to relay stories of their Impact Aid challenges to us for inclusion in what we're calling *Our School District Stories: Impact Aid Challenges in Their Own Words*. What follows are localized accounts of how reductions in Impact Aid funding has affected public school districts throughout this country and why Impact Aid is so important to the more than 12 million students who attend these schools.

In 1950, President Harry S Truman signed into law legislation that has come to form the very bedrock of federal education programs. That program, known as Impact Aid, directly reimburses over 1,500 school districts nationwide.

Impact Aid is the federal government's attempt to compensate school districts for lost revenue, where federal ownership or federal activity adversely interferes with any or all of the basic revenue sources of which school districts avail themselves: residential taxes, property taxes from business and industry, sales taxes, income taxes and local licenses and fees.

In lieu of taxes, the federal government has a responsibility to provide the taxpayer with relief through Impact Aid. This was Truman's promise.

But since 1969, the federal government has been unable to keep up with basic support payments to affected school districts, and today, appropriations from the federal government averages only 60 percent of the maximum payment necessary to keep these 1,500 school districts running on par with school districts that do not have a federal presence in their communities. Students in federally impacted schools don't get a fair shake from the start.

The booklet chronicles some of the results of this ineffective payment system, but, in the "Making Do with Less" section, you will also see that some schools have found ways to succeed despite the inequity.

NAFIS hopes you find these local "snapshots" to be beneficial when you prepare statements, testimony and other speeches for your Members.

JOB CUTS

Central Union School District, CA

"Since March of 2009, we have experienced a \$2.2 million cut, or right at 10%," said Superintendent Ron Seaver. These cuts resulted in the elimination of three technology teachers and three full time physical education teachers.

Fallbrook Union Elementary School District, CA

Stagnant 8002 Impact Aid funding has already negatively affected the Fallbrook Union Elementary School District. If there is not an increase in the appropriated funding stream for Impact Aid, the district will be forced to make the difficult decision to reduce Assistant Principal and teacher positions and eliminate on site library staff.

Cynicism is replacing inspiration as impossible goals for student achievement and demands for higher standards for all are met with inadequate resources, lack of time, and excessive work loads.

Camden County Schools, GA

Over the past two years, the Camden County School District faced massive budget reductions that forced them to eliminate 43 certified teaching and administrative positions.

"These losses have created an overwhelming strain on the community's ability to support education during a time when expectations and accountability for

student success are extraordinary.” — *William C. Hardin, Ed.D, Superintendent of Schools*

Lemont Township High School District 210, IL

Recently, Lemont High School District 210 has been financially impacted by a combination of federal and state economic issues. At the federal level, this district has experienced reduced and delayed impact aid payments that have necessitated several teachers being let go and less professional development opportunities for the remaining educators. In addition, several administrator salaries were frozen. The district recognizes that the above steps were not enough to balance the budget and more faculty and staff will have to be laid off in the future.

Mascoutah Community Unit School District 19, IL

Impact Aid funding comprises an estimated 1/3 of Mascoutah Community Unit School District’s operating budget and 57% of the students are federally connected. Over the past three years, the student population of Mascoutah Community Unit School District has increased by 10% annually; concurrently, there has been a 5% increase of certified staff persons. However, strain on local contribution rates threaten to necessitate the elimination of 40 certified staff persons over two years.

Leland Public School District, MI

Federal 8002 Impact Aid comprises over 8% of the Leland Public School District operational budget. The district is producing great results with the resources they have. For example, Standard and Poor’s School Evaluation Report has described Leland Public School’s overall testing performance as “well above” and “exceptionally above” state norms. Currently faced with a cut in state funding, the Leland Public School District anticipates staff layoffs. “If the federal funding is reduced or held back we will be facing even greater cuts,” said business manager Sandy Potts. Six of the thirty-seven teachers in the school district are employed by Impact Aid funding, and the positive results the Leland has previously been praised for cannot be sustained without their help.

Swain County Schools, NC

Swain County serves a student population that is 25% Native American and operates in a county that is comprised of over 85% federal property. In the last 18 months, the district has experienced budget reversions and cuts totaling \$750,000, a figure that is almost 90% of its county appropriations. The district’s finance officer states that the highest priority is maintaining jobs. “We are not asking for more than our fair share - just that the existence of federal

lands in our county not jeopardize the education of our children and the employment of our staff.” — Jan Letendre, Finance Officer

Santee Community School District, NE

The Santee Community School District has so great a federal presence, the property tax does not even provide enough funds to pay for a single teacher. Therefore, Impact Aid is a “necessity to survive,” said the district business manager.

Bennett County School District 3-1, SD

“Because we live in a fairly remote area, and work with students that face many challenges, it many times is difficult to recruit highly qualified staff members. Over the years, Impact Aid has enabled us to offer competitive benefits and salary. To emphasize the importance of Impact Aid, a few years ago we fell out of ‘heavy impact aid.’ The result was a difference of over \$1 million dollars a year. The result was the loss of 14 staff, reduced busing, and the elimination of a number of programs. Over the past few years, we have struggled to get by. Let me emphasize the importance that Impact Aid is for our district.” — *Bennett County School District Administrator*

Colome Consolidated School District, SD

“The Colome Consolidated School District has made cuts in staff but has been faced with increasing class sizes for the 2010 school year. The Wood and Witten schools have seen cuts in certified staff and the Wood school has also seen classified cuts regarding paraprofessionals and building operations personnel. As a result, the multi-grade classrooms in the Wood and Witten schools have an increased number of grade levels in each classroom requiring the remaining certified staff to assume additional duties beyond their increased educational roles. The Colome schools have also faced increased class sizes in the elementary, middle school, and high school areas. Additional staff, neither certified nor classified, has been hired due to tight budget constrictions and increased overall costs.” — *Colome Consolidated School District Administrator*

Custer School District 16-1, SD

Custer County in southwest South Dakota has its tax revue base impacted by federal ownership of 50% of the county. Impact Aid funding comprises 15% of the school district’s general budget, and these dollars are used to recruit teachers, increase the base teacher salary, provide a Family Advocate position, and continue to provide library staffing. Without Impact Aid resources, approximately 30 certified and classified staff persons would lose their job.

Douglas School District 51-1, SD

"Budget wise we support Special Education with \$900,000.00 from impact aid in addition to the revenue we get from state and federal sources. If impact aid is cut we would be forced to reduce staffing in other areas to free up the necessary dollars to continue supporting Special Education." —*Douglas School District Administrator*

Hot Springs Independent School District 23-2, SD

In many of the past years, Hot Springs Independent School district saw a declining number of students enrolled within the district and required reductions in its staff. However, in the past year, elementary enrollment numbers increased and forced advanced math class sizes to increase to 29-30 students per class. Hot Springs Independent School District is proud of the effective ways they spend the funds they do have on all day kindergarten, technology systems, alternative education programs, and profession development, and has met federal AYP standards since the standard's inception. "Without the revenue from Impact Aid, the district would have further need to cut programs and staff. This would have affected the educational program drastically," said Business Manager Marcia Jackson.

Platte Geddes School District, SD

"At the present time, the Platte-Geddes School District has not received funding in over a year and with the current financial crisis at the State level, the Platte-Geddes District will have to look at staff reduction if the funding from Section 8002 is not received." —*Platte Geddes School District Administrator*

Sisseton School District, SD

"South Dakota, like many other rural states, is experiencing a significant decline in its population of school-age children. Since most of the districts' revenue sources parallel enrollment trends, revenue is decreasing as enrollment declines.... The district school board recognized that as enrollment and revenue decline, expenditures must be curtailed as well. The board took a proactive approach. They built a 5th grade wing onto their elementary school and a 6th-8th grade addition onto their high school facility and closed their 1936 middle school building allowing them to reduce staff by approximately 10% over the past two years. However, with the elementary and middle school both in NCLB school improvement for reading and/or math, the consideration of further staff reductions may need to be postponed." —*Sisseton School District Administrator*

Winner School District 59-2, SD

"Impact Aid funding is critical to the success of the students who attend the Winner School District. The funding from Impact Aid replaces the tax dollars that the Winner School district would not otherwise receive. Every bit of

revenue is important to the operation of the school district. The Winner School District initiated significant reductions in positions and other expenses during the 08-09 academic year and has developed a five year general fund plan where Impact Aid will be relied on heavily due to the potential zero percent increase the state of South Dakota may enact for the 2010-2011 academic year. We cannot afford to lose or have decreases in any funding source and instead need to find additional revenues to meet the requirements of AYP to address the needs of at-risk students and be competitive in attracting the brightest and best teachers to the Winner School District.” — *Winner School District Administrator*

Burkburnett Independent School District, TX

In Burkburnett Independent School District, 29% of the students are federally impacted. The school district has determined that cuts in Impact Aid would force teaching staff to be reduced and class sizes would be increased.

York County School Division, VA

As a percent of total students, the York County School Division is the most heavily federally impacted school division in Virginia. The York County School Division eliminated 23 jobs in Fiscal Year 2010 and is anticipating further reduced funding for Fiscal Year 2011 that will necessitate the loss of 55 additional jobs. To York County, fully funding Impact Aid would mean, “[the school division] would not had to eliminate the 77 positions in FY10 and FY11,” said Chief Financial Officer Dennis Jarrett.

Oak Harbor School District 201, WA

Recently, the Oak Harbor School District endured a 10% reduction in its entire teaching staff. The elimination of 30 out of 300 teaching positions has led to an average increase in class size of 3 students and the cancellation of many elective classes, summer school, and professional development opportunities. Superintendent Rick Schulte commented on how the loss of such opportunities can influence teacher effectiveness, “Middle school teachers now teach an extra 25 to 30 students every day. Teachers must use valuable planning time to supervise bus lines and lunch rooms. Three all-day staff development and training days have been eliminated, leaving little or no time to train teachers in new approaches and methods.” In addition, numerous custodial, groundwork, maintenance, secretarial, and library aide staff positions have been eliminated. Looking ahead, Oak Harbor School District prepares to cut 15 more certified and classified staff persons in Fiscal Year 2011.

Toppenish School District 202, WA

Over the past two years, the Toppenish School District has been impacted by a \$7 million reduction in funding and unfunded increases. The financial loss led

to a reduction in 8 teachers and administrators and 4 classified staff for the 2009-2010 school year. In an effort to continue dealing with the funding reduction, Toppenish School District anticipates more job cuts for 2010-2011, impacting 30 educators and staff. Additionally, the financial strain will affect the remaining faculty and staff by reductions in working hours and benefits.



SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

Geary County Unified School District 475, KS

Increased Impact Aid funding would allow Geary County Unified School District facilities to be modernized. The buildings were constructed over a half century ago and two of the elementary schools in the district are over 75 years old. Additionally, the post elementary schools now are over crowded by over 400 students.

Baraga Township School District, MI

State reductions in average per pupil expenditure coupled with increases in operational costs cause Baraga Township to heavily rely on Impact Aid. The funding supports 20% of their instructional programming expenses. In addition, the district has the ongoing expense of operating a seventy-year old coal fire steam system to heat its K-2 building that is in constant need of repair.

Minnewaukan Public School District, ND

Minnewaukan Public School is a small, rural school overlooking Devils Lake in east central North Dakota, and approximately 80% of the school's 240 enrolled students are Native American. Though the lake provides a view of the natural environment, it is simultaneously threatening the safety and existence of the school itself. Devils Lake is rising, and the lowest elevation of the school is only two and a half feet above the projected levels of the lake for the coming summer.

"It is vital for children to have a school in which they are safe, nurtured, loved and challenged. This is what we strive to provide for our students. It would be devastating for the children, parents, teachers, paraprofessionals, cooks, bus drivers, janitors and administration should we lose our school due to flooding." —*Jean Callahan, Elementary School Principal*

Bennett County School District 3-1, SD

"Impact Aid is and has been essential in an effort to provide quality education for students at Bennett County. Roughly 33% of our land falls off the tax rolls. Because of this, it would be almost impossible to construct any new buildings or make any significant capital improvements. A few years ago, we completed a \$2.5 million facility that provided a new kitchen and lunchroom, classrooms, community room, and a multi-purpose room. Without Impact Aid funds, this much needed facility would not have been possible. Even with this most needed improvement, our other buildings [are in need of] major repairs and improvements." *Bennett County School District Administrator*

Douglas School District 51-1, SD

The presence of Ellsworth Air Force Base in the Douglas School District means the district does not receive sufficient funding from the capitol outlay process to finance construction on a new school. The district is planning to build a new elementary facility to replace a 1960's building, upgrade the middle school to geo thermal heating and cooling, and improve school security by adding an addition, and is dependent on Impact Aid payments to modernize its facilities.

Eagle Butte School District 20-1, SD

"The Impact Aid 8007 funds, approximately \$35,000 per year, have helped keep our facilities maintained and up to date. Without these funds, we would probably have serious problems finding funds for roofing repairs and general maintenance. As so many reservation schools, we have an extremely limited tax base compared to most schools." —*Eagle Butte School District Administrator*

Highmore-Harrold School District, SD

The Highmore-Harrold School District is a newly formed district in the Hyde and Hughes counties of South Dakota, and fifteen percent of the district is federal land. The district has new high school and middle school facilities, but the elementary, kitchen, shop, and lunchroom facilities need to be modernized or replaced. In addition, the district rents its auditorium facility from the county. The district's handicapped accessibility areas also need to be replaced or renovated.

McIntosh School District 15-1, SD

"Impact Aid construction dollars are needed to alleviate an ongoing asbestos problem in the building." —*McIntosh School District Administrator*

McLaughlin Independent School District 15-2, SD

The McLaughlin Independent School District is located entirely within the Standing Rock Sioux Indian Reservation, giving the district very little tax base. The almost 90 year old Middle and High School building lacks a ventilation system and the boiler heating system is original to the 1921 construction. In addition, there are some safety features such as fire-resistant walls and sprinkler systems with which the building is not equipped. The district simply cannot afford to modernize or replace the facility without Impact Aid support.

Mobridge Pollock School District 62-6, SD

"Geographic isolation, poverty and unemployment, and depressed local conditions have placed a financial hardship on a school district which has the sixth lowest assessment for educational purposes in South Dakota. Currently the Mobridge-Pollock School District finds itself in a very difficult situation. The Mobridge-Pollock School district is faced with construction of a new high school and renovation and repair of the middle school/junior high. The high school building, which was built in the 1923, is no longer safe due to structural deficiencies and has been replaced. The Mobridge-Pollock School District passed a \$7.9 million bond for the high school construction project, however, due to increased construction costs and inflation the project could not be completed. The bond for the high school new construction portion places the school district at the maximum limit allowed by South Dakota State law with a debt service repayment for a period of twenty years. The school district has no bonding authority available or any other local resources available for the renovation and repair required in the middle school/junior high facility and must pursue funding from outside sources." —*Mobridge Pollock School District Administrator*

Oelrichs School District, SD

"The average daily attendance has leveled out over the past 5 years, however we do have a waiting list each year, The district would recognize increased enrollment if it had the facilities to accommodate more students." —*Oelrichs School District Administrator*

Pierre School District, SD

"Another area of concern for the Pierre School District is capital outlay funding. When compared to other districts in the state, the Pierre School District has available one of the lowest amounts of capital outlay funding per student. This is primarily due to the large amount of property within the district that is owned by state government and exempt from property taxes. Maintaining facilities and equipment and planning for future capital outlay needs is a challenge for the district." —*Pierre School District Administrator*

Killeen Independent School District, TX

Killeen Independent School District currently serves over 39,000 students. The district continues to grow by about 1,200 students each year, and funding facilities and finding space to accommodate the growing needs is an ongoing difficulty in the district.



MATERIALS CUTS

Fallbrook Union Elementary School District, CA

The Fallbrook Union Elementary School District has been affected by a lack of increase in Section 8002 funding. Specific material cuts that have impacted this district include the inability to repair or replace dated technology, no new textbooks for the English and Language Arts, loss of library materials, loss of bus transportation on Camp Pendleton, and inability to provide fine arts instruction or materials. If funding even remains stagnant, the district faces even more material reductions by eliminating additional educational software purchases and closing the on site school library, limiting student and parent access to those materials.

Mascoutah Community Unit School District 19, IL

Scott Air Force Base provides about 57% of the students in Mascoutah Community Unit School District. If the Impact Aid program is level funded or cut, Dr. Sam McGowen projects material cuts would be necessary in transportation, food service, and textbooks.

The loss of the positions and other equipment and supplies will have a negative impact on student achievement for all students, including federally connected students.

Leland Public School, MI

"Leland Public School buys necessary goods and services from many area vendors, including local small businesses, regional co-ops, and local farmers. Our school is a vital gathering place and a community resource for programs in the arts, music, sports and early childhood education," said a school district document. Impact Aid accounts for more than 8% of Leland Public School's operating budget and pays for one year's worth of teaching supplies and one

classroom's textbooks, and the district is facing massive budget cuts for the upcoming fiscal years.

York County School Division, VA

"Areas that have been significantly reduced in the operating budget include instructional technology refurbishment, textbooks, student transportation, facility maintenance and central office support to the schools. The loss of the positions and other equipment and supplies will have a negative impact on student achievement for all students, including federally connected students." — *Dennis Jarrett, Chief Financial Officer*

Oak Harbor School District 201, WA

"Libraries may be closed. Textbook and library book purchases will be cancelled. Supplies and materials will be reduced...computers will age and deteriorate and will not be replaced. Computer infrastructure will fail as computer technicians are laid off. The exact number of reductions will depend on the extent of the impact aid cutbacks." — *Dr. Rick Schulte, Superintendent*



PROGRAM CUTS

The Galena Interior Learning Academy, AK

GCSD operates a high school vocational education program for Alaska Native students on a BRACed Air Base on the Yukon River. If current levels of funding are maintained we anticipated space for 200 students each presented instructional, residential and food costs. While Alaska presents an “equalized status” for impact aid, Galena receives approximately \$200,000 impact aid all presented to help fund this program. Students come from villages too small for direct contact instruction with many here for relief from “at risk” social or family challenges. Alaska Native students present a forty presented a dropout rate contributing an even higher value to these residential program operations. The State of Alaska provides about fifty-percent of student costs for board and room and the district uses impact aid to help fill the gap. As the level of impact aid diminishes we can count on eliminating one student space for every \$10,000 we come short. Ours is a program where impact aid directly contributes to a native students opportunity to be in school in a safe and healthy environment.

The money received from Impact Aid has allowed the school district to provide for the staff and students in a way that would not be possible otherwise.

Fallbrook Union Elementary School District, CA

The lack of increased funding in Section 8002 of Impact Aid has affected the number and types of programs Fallbrook Union Elementary School District has been able to provide for its students and parents. Elementary band and coral programs were eliminated, the Career Education Programs for students at

Camp Pendleton are not funded, the district eliminated after school enrichment programs, and there has been a loss of professional development and counseling services for students on Camp Pendleton.

Lemont Township High School District 210, IL

Lemont Township High School District has had to make a number of program cuts to reflect the reduction in Impact Aid payments. Summer driver's education, math centers, field trips, and busing for extra-curricular activities are all district programs that had to be reduced or eliminated.

Mascoutah Community Unit School District 19, IL

"Currently Scott Air Force Base is considered a compassionate assignment for parents of students with disabilities as we are known for providing quality programs. Further cutbacks would seriously impact the district's financing as these students must be taken care utilizing even greater proportions of the funding from regular education programs." — *Dr. Sam McGowen, Superintendent*

McLaughlin Independent School District 15-2, SD

"Class sizes continue to grow even though the budget may not. The McLaughlin School District enrollment has increased by about 5% in the last 5-6 years. Costs have risen by more than 25% while the revenue, mostly from Impact Aid, has increased by only about 21%. Over the years, McLaughlin has found it necessary to cut programs essential to our rural area, such as Family and Consumer Sciences, Technology courses including Industrial and Information Technology, and many others. McLaughlin was not able to offer music programs the last five years. Currently there is no Technology course offered." — *Paul Priebe, Federal Programs*

Toppenish School District 202, WA

Over the past two years, Toppenish School District faced a 20% budget reduction. The 2010-2011 school year will be impacted by this massive reduction by cutting full year kindergarten and the Readiness to Learn Program.

"Impact Aid has given us the opportunity to provide intervention programs and enrichment programs," said Superintendent Steve Myers. The district's intervention programs include breakfast and homework clubs. The school provides enrichment opportunities through its arts, music, choir, and pottery programs. Without Impact Aid, these programs could not exist.

Fremont County School District 14, WY

Four programs the district would be forced to discontinue without Impact Aid funding are preschool, school breakfasts and lunches, cultural in-services, and staff retention.

FURTHER CHALLENGES

Fort Thomas Unified School District 7, AZ

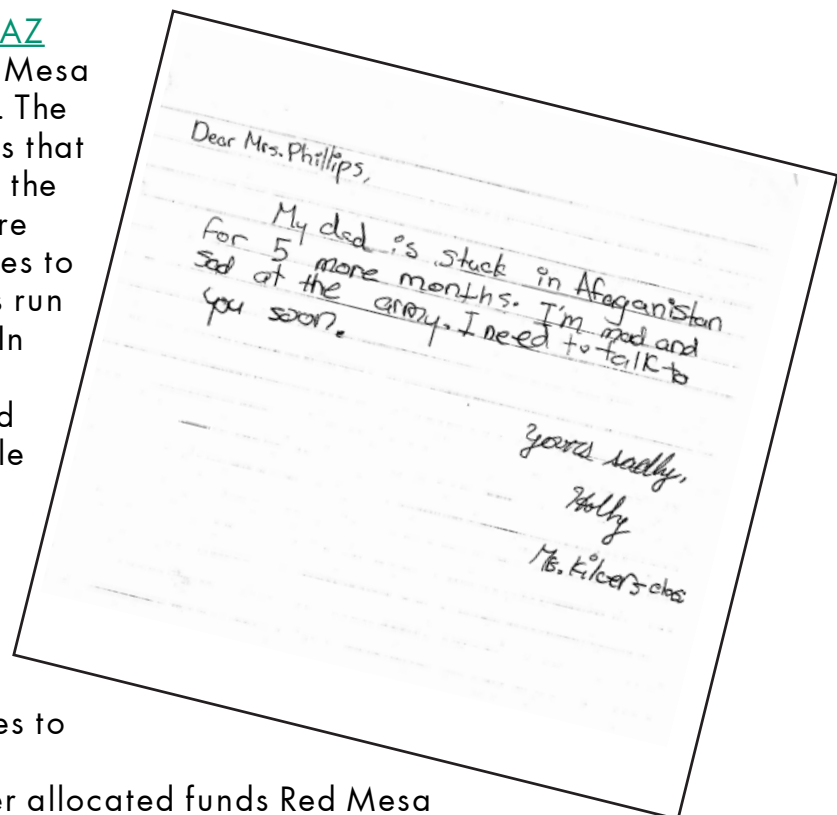
"Our school is located in an rural area without teacher housing, recruiting draw backs, 95% per cent free and reduced meals, draw students from an economically depress community with a high unemployment rate, and impact aid is about 50% of our annual budget. With our state in dire financial problems we need to make it known nationally our dependence on impact aid, the best educational funding available directly to the student via county treasurer's office to the school direct." —Dr. Leon Ben, Superintendent

Red Mesa School District, AZ

One challenge facing Red Mesa School District is isolation. The school district's size means that some children must wait in the dark at the bus stops before dawn and then ride 60 miles to school one way. The buses run almost 1,000 miles daily. In addition, schools must operate in a self-contained way, and staff must be able to handle almost any emergency situation while waiting for first responders if necessary. However, the school district has learned to use technological resources to overcome the isolation.

"With increased and better allocated funds Red Mesa Unified School District, an all isolated rural district, will be able to provide roads, facilities, and highly qualified staff necessary to create what every child in America deserves: access to public education."

San Carlos Unified School District 20, AZ

The community of Bylas seeks to fund a school district in their community as part of a community planning initiative to encourage a higher student success rate.

Whiteriver Unified School District, AZ

"Our special needs student population is higher than the national averages. Impact Aid provides needed funding support to our 20-25% Special Needs population. This number could be increased by 10% in our District according to District personnel." — *Orlando Carroll, Governing Board Member*

North Chicago Community Unit School District 187, IL

"Without Impact Aid, our schools can't adequately function and compete on an equal level of opportunity in Education." — *Henrietta Graham, School Board Member*

"The Impact Aid dollars can be allocated to best meet the needs of the district. District 187 thrives on its Impact Aid dollars and our Super-status Impact Aid dollars to help provide educational services to approximately 4,000 plus students from North Chicago Illinois and the Great Lakes Naval Training command." — *Sharon Epps, School Board Member*

"The impact aide funding is most important in North Chicago IL School District 187, without the funding our school district would not be able to stay open we would have to close our schools and we would have to bus our students to other school district such as Lake Forest, Highland Park and other districts in the North Shore area. We educate the students at the Great Lakes Navel Station along with our students and all deserve the same education as the students from across the country." — *Missouri Myers, School Board Member*

Edmonson County Schools, KY

"For our small rural school district, Impact Aid funding has proven year after year to save teaching jobs and has enabled technology enhancements critical to the success of our students. Without Impact Aid funding our district would face unprecedented reductions in teaching staff and reduction in program services to students." — *Kathy Meredith, Finance Officer*

Carthage Central School District, NY

"The Carthage Central School District is located on the perimeter of Fort Drum in rural Jefferson County NY. Due to the Fort expansion, Jefferson County is the only county in New York State that has had a population increase. It is also one of the poorest counties in the state with a very high unemployment rate. The District is classified as a high-needs school district with over 60% free and reduced lunch in some schools. We have grown by over 700+ students in the

past two years. Our state aid and impact aid have not kept pace with this growth. This coming school year we are looking at state aid shortfalls of almost \$2,000,000. That coupled with increases in contractual obligations and health insurance will have us addressing our 10-11 budget starting with a deficit of almost \$4,000,000. Many of my colleagues can make up their state aid shortfalls by eliminating positions and increasing class size. I do not have that luxury as we are already operating a bare bones budget having cut many of the so called 'extras' and our enrollment continues to increase." —*Joseph M. Catanzaro, Superintendent*

Andes Central School District 103, SD

Approximately 8% of the 204 square mile Andes Central School District is federal property and 53% of the student population is federally connected. Therefore, Impact Aid funding comprises 27% of all school district revenue. Andes Central School District values these funds because 57% is divided into the general budget, 36% to capitol outlay, 5% to pensions, and 2% to food service.

Bon Homme School District, SD

On June 30, 2008, the general funds balance was \$267,242.45 only because Bon Homme School District was able to access \$653,000 of Impact Aid dollars. Again, this year the school district was able to meet their own general fund obligations only because of funding they received from Impact Aid. However, due to the inadequate funding for Section 8002 the district will run short on general operating funds without asking for additional dollars from their tax payers.

"This places an undue burden on the Bon Homme local taxpayers because of the federal government not recognizing its financial obligations to them. We have to date received no Impact Aid payment for this school year." —*Bon Homme School District Administrator*

Colome Unified School District, SD

"As a rural district, we also face many challenges. In addition to poverty and unemployment the long distances between the attendance centers and student homes is a difficult circumstance than both the district and parents must manage. It requires lengthy bus routes over rural roads and creates high pupil transportation costs for the district. These costs are reflected in cuts made to other budgeted areas." —*Colome Unified School District Administrator*

McIntosh School District 15-1, SD

As a rural district, McIntosh Schools have the challenge of recruiting highly qualified educators. Impact Aid funding allows the school district to attract the educators who have helped McIntosh Schools consistently make AYP; and in 2008, the high school was featured in U.S. News and World Report's Best High

Schools in the small enrollment division. If the high school were to lose its Impact Aid funding, it simply would not exist. Without the McIntosh School District, children would have to ride an hour or two one-way daily to receive an education.

Oelrichs School District, SD

"The Oelrichs School District 23-3 relies heavily on the Impact Aid funding. Beside our Native American count, the district has 34,275 acres of the Buffalo Gap National Grasslands. With the combination of 8002 and 8003 Impact Aid money, which is over 40% of our total general fund budget, it plays a major role in keeping this school district open." — *Oelrichs School District Administrator*

Pierre School District, SD

"Due to the current economic situation and reductions in state and federal funding, The Pierre School district will experience a decline in revenue available to our general fund of an estimated \$600,000 in the upcoming fiscal year. We will struggle to find the financial resources to meet the requirements of No Child Left Behind and increase student achievement, to address the needs of a growing population of at-risk students, and to be competitive in attracting the most qualified teachers to the Pierre School District. The upcoming fiscal year will be particularly challenging. The timely payment of impact aid allocations to local school districts is more critical now than ever." — *Pierre School District Administrator*

Shannon County School District 1, SD

"Shannon County School District uses Impact Aid funds to construct, repair, and maintain school buildings, purchase buses and instructional materials and resources for students. If Impact Aid funds were reduced or eliminated, the district would experience a continual deterioration of buildings, buses, and educational programs." — *Shannon County School Administrator*

Todd County School District 66-1, SD

"Todd County School District is located in south-central South Dakota. The district services approximately 2,000 students in twelve attendance centers spread over a 1,500 square mile area. The Rosebud Reservation (Todd County) is the fifth poorest county in the country (US Census); we have 58.7% of our population under the age of 18 living in poverty (Kids Count, 2005); we are third (11.9%) in the state for percentage of children under the age of five who live in poverty (Kids Count 2007); and we rank first with 33.4% of children under the age of 15 living in poverty (Kids Count 2007) compared to the other children in South Dakota. All (100%) Todd County students are eligible for free or reduced lunch.... The Todd County School District is currently approaching

30 students per classroom size at our largest elementary location. Our school district is currently seeking financing to construct a new Career Tech high school to replace over 50 year old current complex. The elementary locations are currently leased from the Bureau of Indian Affairs in buildings dating as far back as 1920's. The school district anticipates a shortfall at completion of ARRA stimulus funding which could be as high as 8% of current overall staffing. Bilingual literacy programs and outside of contract professional development for staff are in jeopardy with continued cuts and state and federal funding." —*Todd County School District Administrator*

Wall School District 51-1, SD

"The IA dollars continue to help offset the lack of adequate funding from the state and without the IA dollars the district would be looking at making huge cuts in staff and programs. The Wall High School, Elementary School and the Wall School District were recognized as distinguished schools in accordance with NCLB, and the staff is 100% highly qualified." —*Wall School District Administrator*

Yankton School District, SD

"Funding from the Impact Aid program is utilized for stabilizing cash flow needs of the district and maintaining quality educational programming as well as manageable class size ratios. Impact aid is essential in providing educational opportunities for students of the Yankton School District." —*Yankton School District Administrator*

Burkburnett Independent School District, TX

"Now, with so much relying on preparing America's next generation, is not the time to cut back in this area.... Cuts would impact BISD as: technology purchases would be severely cut; teaching staff would be reduced and class sizes would increase; maintenance and enhancements to instructional facilities would decrease significantly."

Killeen Independent School District, TX

"Funding from impact aid is critical to the district's ability to provide quality facilities and services to the students in Killeen ISD and particularly to the students from military families who are over fifty percent of our 39,000 plus student enrollment. Impact aid has allowed Killeen ISD to expand our counseling staff to meet the emotional needs of our students who have had one or both military parents deployed from Fort Hood multiple times to combat zones since 2003. These counselors have been especially critical when students or staff have had fathers, mothers, or spouses killed or wounded in combat." —*Tal Anderson, Executive Officer*

Central Kitsap School District 401, WA

"Currently we are facing a budget shortfall for the 2010-11 school year of up to \$7.1 million as our state legislature struggles to balance the state budget. As a result of these reductions class size will increase, interventions for struggling students will be reduced and training to equip our staff with the skills to address student needs, technology and best practices will be significantly reduced or eliminated.... If on top of these reductions, Impact Aid is not funded adequately the cuts to students, programs and staff jobs will be severely felt by the District and our community." —*David McVicker, Executive Director of Business and Operations*

Wapato School District 207, WA

"Impact Aid in the Wapato School District has been and continues to be a vital funding source as we actively work to improve student achievement and fulfill the District's mission of preparing students for a global economy. The funding becomes even more essential as the State of Washington struggles to balance a nearly 3-billion dollar budget shortfall. The State House and Senate just released their budget proposals and each identifies significant cuts for K-12 education. It is yet to be seen what kind of a State budget will be adopted but we can be sure education will take a hit. That again emphasizes the importance of the Impact Aid Program." —*Mike Balmelli, Community Relations Manager*

Fremont County School District 14, WY

"Impact Aid monies allow us to compete with neighboring districts when hiring Highly Qualified Staff." —*Fremont County School District 14 Video*



MAKING DO WITH WHAT WE HAVE

Whiteriver Unified School District 20, AZ

"Impact Aid serves our school district's budget in several ways that impacts most importantly one High School, one Junior School, and three Elementary Schools with a combined student population of almost 2,000. Our school district is at 100% LOT. Impact Aid increases our budget capacity in our Maintenance and Operations. It funds our 10% M & O Override approved by the voters in November 2009 that goes for five years. It also funds our 5% K-3 Override of \$340,000 that goes for an additional 2 years." — *Orlando Carroll, Governing Board Member*

Adams County School District 14, CO

"With the help of federal Impact Aid, Adams 14 is able to give an enriched education to their students pre-school through high school, which would include community college classes and technical certifications." — *Dr. Sue Chandler, Superintendent*

Geary County Unified School District 475, KS

Mahnomen Independent School District, MS

Impact Aid funding provides for programs such as additional vocational and college preparatory courses and an Alternative Learning Center to address the unique needs of a community whose students may not fall under the traditional school model. In addition, the district uses Impact Aid funding to directly meet the unique needs of their student population such as providing additional evening transportation so that students that would otherwise be unable to utilize the Alternative Learning Center, after-school tutoring, and other extra-curricular activities.

Harlem School District 12, MT

"Our student population is 94% American Indian with a free and reduced lunch percentage of around 74%. With this population we need to provide more services to our students such as smaller student to teacher ratios, after school tutors, after-school programs and practice buses, free school lunch and breakfast, greater support staff (nurse, psychologist, and extra counselors), etc. Impact Aid provides the funding for the above much needed services for our unique student population...Our certified staff has an average teaching experience of 14 years for our district. The educational experiences provided by our veteran staff levels the playing field for future education opportunities for all of our students. This funding also allows our experienced staff the resources to provide timely and appropriate interventions to effectively improve student achievement." —Nancy J. Coleman, Superintendent

Standing Rock Community Schools, ND

Standing Rock Community Schools uses federal funding to provide technological resources to its students, a teacher housing complex, and a variety of classroom programs.

Santee Community School District, NE

The Santee Community School District has depended on two major Impact Aid construction grants for necessary additions that include doubling the K-12 building and a new library, "which has not only helped enticing students to read more but has provided a place for community members to unite with the school on different activities," said District Business Manager Kristy Cayler.

Southeast Local School District, OH

The Southeast Local School District set in Northeast Ohio is impacted by the presence of federal properties in four of its five townships, which comprise 28% of the total property within the district. The Impact Aid funding this district receives offsets the loss in tax revenue and allows for technology and curriculum enhancement programs. In addition, the district encompasses over

125 square miles, and a large bus fleet is in place to accommodate the transportation needs of students and families. Impact Aid provides the necessary resources to ensure the buses are maintained and replaced on a safe schedule.

Bison School District, SD

"Being a remote, sparse, rural district; it is a challenge to attract and retain highly qualified teachers. In recent years, this is something the Bison School District has been able to do. Federal Impact Aid funds have helped the district to accomplish some of [its] achievements...with many other sources of funding decreasing, the Impact Aid funds are increasingly important in maintaining a quality education program for the students of the Bison School District." —*Bison School District Administrator*

Chamberlain School District 1, SD

"Impact Aid has provided the funding to implement researched-based, culturally oriented educational programming that have significantly help increase student achievement for Native American students...It is our hope that additional Impact Aid funding can be acquired to help the district promote high levels of student achievement and quality educational facilities for all students." —*Chamberlain School District Administrator*

Custer School District 16-1, SD

Impact Aid comprises approximately 15% of Custer School District's general budget. Impact Aid funds support district programs such as the vocational courses of woodworking, welding, and consumer science as well as music, art, and physical education programs. School district administrators stated that without Impact Aid those academic programs would be cut.

Dupree School District 64-2, SD

The Dupree School District encompasses nearly 1,400 square miles, and some students must travel up to 100 miles daily to attend school. Approximately 75% of the students in the school district are federally connected, and only 6% of the district's budget comes from local taxes. "Impact aid funding has allowed us to successfully build additional classrooms, a new library and an elementary computer lab unto our existing facility which replaced unsafe and overcrowded modular units. A new high school addition was completed in the fall of 2009 which also included three classrooms, two science labs and a new computer lab," said a Dupree School District Administrator. Dupree School District has met AYP standards for the past five years in all areas, and attributes much of their success to the possibilities provided to their students by Impact Aid.

Flandreau School District 50-3, SD

"At Flandreau Public Schools, Impact Aid monies have kept us from making large cuts in our budget year in and year out. The funds have been used in the general fund so we do not have to raise local taxes beyond what the state allows. Impact Aid has allowed us to keep our elementary and middle school class size down to a manageable level. The funds have also been used to continue a Reading Recovery Program that helps first graders read to grade level. This program has greatly increased our test scores, as our elementary school has been a 'Distinguished School' for the past five years. Our elementary, middle and high schools have also been 'Distinguished' within the past two years as all of our schools have made AYP since the 2003-2004 school year. Our elementary school was honored as a National Distinguished Title I school during the 2009-2010 school year. All teachers at Flandreau Public Schools are 'Highly Qualified'. We take pride in the fact that our Native American students' test scores are among the highest in the state and we are committed to remain that way." — *Flandreau School District Administrator*

Hill City School District 51-2, SD

"The Impact Aid money received by Hill City Schools allows the district to provide education beyond the minimum requirements. These dollars help hire the staff needed to service students in both regular and special education and keep the district competitive in staff salaries. As a result of Impact Aid dollars, the district is able to reduce class size, which is a real benefit to educational progress. The Impact Aid money received by Hill City Schools allows the district to provide education beyond the minimum requirements. Hill City was able to establish an alternative school, now in its fifth year. A laptop program for the fourth through twelfth grade students which provides 21st Century skills. Honors level courses give students the opportunity to challenge themselves in preparation for post secondary training. Impact Aid has also provided funds to help purchase up-to-date computer equipment, keeping the district a leader in technology, an aspect of education that is increasingly significant. In addition, these monies have helped build and renovate school buildings, an essential factor in keeping the educational environment safe and accessible." — *Hill City School District Administrator*

Kadoka Area School District 35-1, SD

The Kadoka Area School District prides itself on offering excellent educational opportunities for its students, despite challenges such as daily bus route of 497 total miles for the district. Kadoka Area School District takes part in the Classroom Connects Initiative, the Reading First Program, provides extracurricular activities, and has been a NASA Explorer School since 2006. In addition, the school recently built a new sports complex with community donations and volunteer labor, demonstrating the community's support for the school and its students.

"We are proud to have Impacted Lands in our district. Unfortunately we suffer a financial loss as a result of this because we receive no tax revenue from the property that is federally owned. Since the Impact Aid program is not fully funded, the funds we do receive do not come close to the amount of tax revenue lost by our district. However, Section 8002 and Section 8003 Impact Aid funds we do receive are critically important in a time of ever increasing costs of educating students in the district." —*Kadoka Area School District Administrator*

Lemmon School District, SD

"The Lemmon School District utilizes the Section 8002 Impact Aid funds in meeting the needs of the school district. The district has utilized the Impact Aid funds to meet the needs of the General Fund. This past year the district utilized \$200,000 of Impact Aid funds for a Capital Outlay remodel project." —*Lemmon School District Administrator*

Lyman School District 42-1, SD

"With approximately 38% of the Lyman School District student population from the Lower Brule Indian Reservation, Impact Aid has become a very important financial partner for the school district to use in trying to meet the many needs of our students. First, Impact Aid funding helps the school district provide three buses for the daily transporting our Lower Brule students. Some of our students travel 80 miles round trip each day for school. Secondly, Impact Aid funding helps the school district hire and retain highly qualified teachers. Since the establishment of NCLB, the Lyman School District has met AYP every year in all of the tested grades." —*Lyman School District Administrator*

Platte Geddes School District, SD

"The Platte Community Schools have been receiving Section 8002 Federal Impact Aid since the early 1990's. Since that time the Platte Community Schools have used the funding for technology for students in grades K-12. The most recent use of the funding was the expansion of our curriculum. The Platte Community Schools were able to add a 1/2 time Art program and 1/2 time Business Education program. We have also used the monies to purchase Smart Boards and projectors for K-12 staff members. With the newly consolidated Platte-Geddes School District funding will be used to continue the Art and Business programs and continue to upgrade our technology throughout the district. Funding from Section 8002 has enabled us to continue to hire highly qualified staff and have a wide variety of course selections for our students." —*Platte Geddes School District Administrator*

Smee School District 15-3, SD

Impact Aid monies provide for many of the programs, materials, and staff for Smee School District. The district uses Impact Aid to increase teacher pay, retain high quality staff, and provide continued professional development opportunities. The monies have been specifically used to hire staff unique to the needs of the district such as a social worker, truancy officer, Lakota Teacher, certified tutors, and a Special Education Director and staff. Impact Aid funding also allows for many programs the district provides including daily preschool, summer school, and special education funding for the 30% of students who have an IEP. The new school building, daycare facility, and other capitol outlay projects would also not be possible without Impact Aid funding.

South Central School District 26-5, SD

"The South Central School District is part of Gregory County, located in south central South Dakota. The School District is found between the Rosebud and Yankton Indian Reservations. The district has a Native-American ADA of 41% and a poverty rate of 71%. Impact Aid has enabled the district to successfully build and maintain excellent facilities. The District has implemented the One to One Laptop Initiative enabling each high school student and faculty member to be connected via their own personal laptop tablets twenty-fours a day. The South Central School District has been on the cutting edge of technology, and despite a very high poverty rate, the district continues to meet AYP each year. Impact Aid dollars are critical in maintaining these high academic standards and for the survival of the South Central School District." — *South Central School District Administrator*

Stanley County School District, SD

"While 80% of our students live in or within five miles of the town of Fort Pierre, we have students living as far as 55 miles from Fort Pierre and this distance is too great for elementary students to travel. Therefore, we continue to operate one rural school. The cost of operating rural school is much greater and raises the cost on a per-ADM basis. We also have a large number of one-parent families and poverty families. Experience shows that these students do not receive that pre-school preparation and school assistance from home and therefore requires additional staff. The Stanley County School District is in direct competition for highly qualified teachers with the Pierre School District, which requires the district to pay comparable salaries and benefits as our larger, wealthier neighbor." — *Stanley County School District Administrator*

Timber Lake School District 20-3, SD

"Our starting salary of \$32,000 for a first year teacher for the 2009-2010 school year was the 11th highest in the state. This base amount will be \$32,700 next school year. This has been the greatest asset we have in hiring and

retaining outstanding teachers. Due to Impact Aid, I feel we have by far the best teaching staff in the northwest corner of South Dakota.” — *Timber Lake School District Administrator*

Wagner Community School District 11-4, SD

Federal Impact Aid dollars have assisted Wagner School District in successfully meeting AYP. The funding provides class sizes to remain at 17 or below, AP and dual credit classes, facility upgrades, summer school programs, a one-to-one laptop initiative, Job For America’s Graduate program, and other initiatives to reduce the district’s drop out rate.

“Without Impact Aid, few if any of these projects or learning opportunities would have been possible. Together they have made a significant difference in the teaching and learning environment of the school district. Without them, and without Impact Aid, teaching and learning in the Wagner Community School would be significantly and negatively impacted. Impact Aid makes a difference in providing a quality education to all children in a federally connected school district!” — *Wagner Community School District Administrator*

Waubay School District 18-3, SD

“Fewer students in the classroom add to the per student cost. Impact Aid funds greatly assist the general fund in helping with the added cost per student due to receiving less state aid. The District is able to maintain a lower number of students in the classroom, which we feel enhance the learning process. We are also able to employ highly qualified staff, meet AYP, and purchase the instructional tools necessary to offer high quality education for the students of the Waubay School District only with the funding from Impact Aid.” — *Waubay School District Administrator*

White River School District 47-1, SD

“White River is located near the Rosebud Reservation. Approximately half of the land in the district is tribal land, affecting the ability of the district to generate local tax revenue. Thirty percent of the general fund budget is from Impact Aid revenue. Four of the five schools in the district are on school improvement. Impact Aid funds are also used for Capitol Outlay, Special Education, and Food Service expenditures. In addition to a full-day kindergarten, the district has a preschool program for three and four year olds. The district has an alternative school program that helps reduce the drop out rate and increase the graduation rate, especially for Native American students. We are also able to offer multiple class sections PK- 12 to reduce class sizes to 15 or fewer students which helps meet the diverse academic needs of the students. Without Impact Aid, the district would face enormous budget shortfalls resulting in cutting services and programs that are currently being provided.” — *White River School District Administrator*

Fort Sam Houston Independent School District, TX

"Because our district is on federal property, we are funded differently. Our district can't raise local taxes or sell bonds for facility construction. Over half of our funding comes from federal Impact Aid funds through the Department of Education. In fact, Impact Aid funds are what keep our doors open. It pays for everything from our school buses, to the library books in the media center. It pays for the computers, white boards, and other technology used in our classrooms. It pays for teachers' salaries, academic programs, and band equipment, as well as my JROTC competitions. If Congress makes cuts in the federal Impact Program, my school and schools like mine all over the country will be hurt. The educational programs they offer will suffer — and that hurts military kids like me and my family." — *Stephanie, Student*

Menominee Indian School District, WI

Menominee Indian School District (MISD) is located almost entirely on the Menominee Indian Reservation and lies with-in the boundaries of Menominee County, Wisconsin. According to Census Data, Menominee County is the poorest county in Wisconsin and is ranked 72 out of 72 (dead last) in *Wisconsin County Health Rankings* since the first publication in 2003.

Although many of our students come from poverty —we *think of them as under resourced*— we have many children who are achieving at high levels. Thanks to the funding of Impact Aid, MISD has been able to develop, implement, and sustain educational programming for approximately 900 students. Some of the evidence of our success:

- All of our schools achieve adequate yearly progress (AYP)
- Our dropout rate declined to 3 students or .92% of the population.
- Our middle school was named a Wisconsin Middle School of Excellence in 2009 and 2010. In addition it is one of five middle schools nationwide selected for the 2010 Breakthrough Schools Award from MetLife Foundation —National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP) which identifies, recognizes and showcases schools that serve large numbers of students in poverty and are high achieving or dramatically improving student achievement.

Impact Aid funding is critical in sustaining our continuous improvement efforts for our under resourced children. Any significant reduction could take us from access and achievement to exclusion and frustration; thus leaving the children we serve behind. Impact Aid is a difference maker for our District and students.

Dear Chairmen Blunt and Cole, Ranking Members Murray and DeLauro:

The National Association of Federally Impacted Schools (NAFIS) strongly urges you and your colleagues to continue recognizing the obligation to federally impacted communities as you set priorities for the Labor-Health and Human Services-Education Appropriations Subcommittee. After soliciting input from the NAFIS Board of Directors, Subgroup Leaders, membership, and having the opportunity to discuss Impact Aid with your staff, we write to express our views regarding Fiscal Year (FY) 2017 funding for the Impact Aid program.

Based on our analysis and discussion below, we urge you to provide up to an \$8 million increase for Federal Properties and a \$35 million increase for Basic Support.

NAFIS represents the 1,200-plus Impact Aid-recipient school districts nationwide, serving over 11 million students, Federal and non-Federal. Impact Aid is the oldest elementary and secondary education program and is a partnership between local communities and the Federal government where there is significant non-taxable property, such as military installations, Indian treaty or trust land, low-rent housing facilities, national parks and laboratories. Congress recognized in 1950 that the Federal government had an obligation to help meet the local responsibility of financing public education in areas impacted by a Federal presence. That same recognition holds true today.

Thank you for the much-needed \$17 million increase in FY 2016. Federally impacted school districts cannot afford stagnant appropriations or a loss of funding. FY 2017, in particular, will require additional funds to ensure a smooth transition to the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Further, we know the tough choices administrators must make when there are cuts to Impact Aid funding. Just four years ago, sequestration forced districts to, among other things, eliminate staff positions, increase class sizes, reduce professional development, cut bus routes, delay technology and facility upgrades.

Section 7003 Basic Support: The situation for federally impacted school districts is a perfect storm – Sequestration and stagnant appropriations have significantly eroded the “purchasing power” of Impact Aid Basic Support payments over the last decade as measured by the Learning Opportunity Threshold, or LOT (See chart). In fact, the payout – sequestration year aside – is at its lowest levels in two decades. At the same time, enrollment and education costs have increased. Additional resources are needed to help school districts close the achievement gap – particularly for American Indian and Alaska Native students. Special education costs have increased, including some dramatic increases for military-connected school districts, where the special needs population can top 20-percent due to the Department of Defense’s compassionate assignment process and creation of “Autism Centers of Excellence.” Finally, programmatic improvements to Impact Aid in ESSA, including a hold harmless to address demographic shifts, and other changes require additional resources.

Program cuts may be the new reality if the LOT payout – and the initial payout the Department of Education can release to school districts each fall – continues to drop. An estimated \$100 million increase for Basic Support over FY 2016 enacted levels would restore the payout – measured in LOT – to 100-percent, the “basic need” payment for school districts based on the formula established by Congress two decades ago. If the LOT payout were above 100-percent:

- The highest-need school districts would receive their full (Maximum) payment
- Mid-and low-impacted school districts would be paid at a rate equal to all other school districts, per a new provision in ESSA

An estimated \$23 million is required simply to maintain the current LOT payout at FY 2016 levels; a total increase of \$35 million would increase the LOT payout for over 1,000 school districts by one-percent. We must make progress to restore the LOT payout to 100-percent.

Section 7002 Federal Properties: Thank you for the continued bipartisan support for these school districts despite requests by the Administration to eliminate funding. NAFIS requests an \$8 million increase for this important line item. *Any* additional funding would be appreciated since this line item has not received an increase since FY 2010. Additional funding would:

- Partially offset the cost of new school districts, including:
 - New school districts that are eligible as the Federal Government continues to acquire property.
 - Consolidated school districts whose eligibility was reinstated via the FY 2014 appropriations bill that cost an estimated \$670,000 per year.
 - New school districts that are eligible based on new provisions in ESSA.
- Partially offset the higher-payment need for current school districts where the Federal Government continues to take property off the local tax rolls.
- Provide badly-needed new funds to all school districts that would be distributed under the new, less subjective formula first established in FY 2013.

Section 7007 Construction: We recommend that Impact Aid Section 7007 funds be distributed under Section 7007(b) competitive grants, since FY 2016 funds were dispersed through Section 8007(a),

formula. Federally impacted school districts need adequate resources to address health and safety code violations and capacity issues that come with educating students in buildings that are, in some cases, over 100 years old, as well as ensure all students have access to 21st century learning environments. Impact Aid construction funds are badly needed and the funding level continues to fall far short of the funding need.

Impact Aid is not supplemental. It is a basic revenue stream that keeps school districts operating. In a quick poll of NAFIS members in November 2015, we asked: “What could your school district do with more Impact Aid?”


- ❖ *Invest in the additional resources needed to provide services to our students regarding social work, **counseling** (drug, alcohol, emotional), and academic assistive services for our struggling students. We are a high poverty district with struggling students and additional staffing and services would be of great benefit to our students PreK through 12. (NY)*
- ❖ *We could use the additional money for staffing - bus monitors, non-instructional paraprofessionals for supervision of students, **intervention programs** and other support services. We would also add to our **school building safety** infrastructure and purchase more cameras and security staff. The final area would be to continue to invest in our on-going curriculum and technology needs. (WA)*
- ❖ *After school **tutoring**, which is necessary for helping our students get the additional time they need on academic skills. This would provide our staff with an option to help students who need one on one time to develop skills with guidance. We also need to continue to make sure that our internet connection is consistent and at least up to 10 Mbs so that we can connect to the many resources for individualized instruction that are necessary to meet the wide variety of needs in the school. (AK)*
- ❖ *Fill our vacant teaching positions through competitive salaries (two positions remain open). . . Purchase updated buses and **expand routes to reduce student bus times** - students travel many times up to two hours in buses filled to capacity; Extend learning opportunities for students that travel 50 to 70 miles to school. Extend opportunities closer to home (i.e. alternative schools, tutoring services, etc.); Hire social workers to work with at-risk families that hinder students’ progress. . . **Enhance career and technical education programs** that serve 60 to 70 percent of our students. . . **Enhance college readiness opportunities** such as campus visits, FAFSA assistance, career programs, etc. (AZ)*
- ❖ ***Hire additional teachers in high need areas such as high school math, high school science and SPED.** More Impact Aid money would allow our school district to remain competitive in regards to teacher salary, thus we could compete with larger districts in attracting high quality teachers. 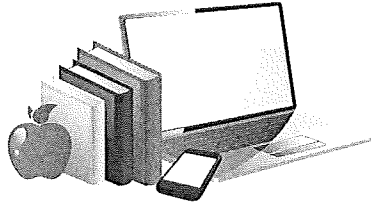

**AGREEMENT BETWEEN
KINGS VIEW COUNSELING SERVICES FOR KINGS COUNTY
And
CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT**

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into as of July 1, 2016, by and between Kings View Counseling Services for Kings County, hereinafter referred to as "KINGS VIEW", and "CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT", mutually agree to enter into the following:

That for, and in consideration of, the agreements hereinafter contained, the above parties mutually agree to the following stipulations:

1. Students must meet the Department of Mental Health guidelines for medical necessity in order to receive services. See attachment A.
2. Services shall be defined as the mental health assessment, and/or screening and/or, individual and/or group therapy and/or rehabilitative and/or case management of students referred by school counselors, administration, teachers, and other school staff members. The exact nature of the service will be based on assessed clinical need and a determination by KINGS VIEW of the most cost effective means of providing that service.
3. Individual students requiring specialized clinical services which cannot be provided at the school site shall be referred to outside appropriate resources including, but not limited to, KINGS VIEW. The interchange of information, and consultation with members of the school staff, teachers, and administration will occur with the written authorization from the parent, legal guardian, or the consumer where it is determined that a consumer may consent for their own treatment.
4. The cost of counseling services provided at the school site will be covered by Medi-Cal where appropriate and by the consumer's parents or responsible party following all KINGS VIEW fee policies. (Fees are computed based upon the Uniform Method of Determining Ability to Pay (UMDAP) that takes into account the parents or responsible party income and operates on a sliding scale.)
5. Once a child is identified as potentially able to benefit from mental health services the child's family will be directed to Kings View's Hanford clinic in order to facilitate opening of the case. In addition to the initial mental health assessment, this process will include completing the financial review, collection of demographic data, and signature of the following documents: Consent for the Treatment of a Minor, receipt for Notice of Privacy Practices, Plan of Care, and other relevant documents.
6. The District shall provide an appropriate confidential space at each identified school site, i.e., an empty classroom, to ensure confidentiality, desk, and access to a phone. A confidential space is defined as a secure area in which treatment staff and consumer can meet with the reasonable expectation that they will not be interrupted. The size of the space must minimally accommodate six individuals. This will allow for

both individual and group services to be offered by the KINGS VIEW clinical staff member.

7. CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT shall also provide an active internet connection.
8. KINGS VIEW reserves the right to identify the school site where services may be provided. If school based services are suspended, KINGS VIEW will continue services or offer to continue services at our nearest clinic.
9. It shall be understood that discussions between students and the representatives of KINGS VIEW will be held in confidence in accordance with State and Federal legislation. Feedback on referrals shall be provided (to those referral sources) that students have or have not been seen, have been referred to outside resources, or no longer need to be seen as long as a release has been signed.
10. CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT will need to prioritize the referrals.
11. CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT shall provide direct access for KINGS VIEW to academic and discipline files, including the Cumulative File. The exchange of information between representatives of CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT and KINGS VIEW shall be carried out in a manner congruent with ethical and legal guidelines.
12. Professional liability insurance for the representatives of KINGS VIEW shall be provided by KINGS VIEW.
13. If CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT requires the KINGS VIEW employee follow the California Education Code Sections 33 192 and 45125.1 requirements, CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT will provide the appropriate forms.
14. If either party can no longer meet its agreed upon stipulations, as stated in the MOU, CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT and KINGS VIEW will discuss, review, and if possible, adjust the MOU.
15. Independent Contractor Status: KINGS VIEW and any and all agents, officers, and employees of KINGS VIEW shall perform the services required hereunder as independent contractors, and not as officers, agents, or employees of CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT. In the performance of such services, KINGS VIEW agrees to exercise discretion and independent judgment to the best of its ability. Payments to KINGS VIEW under this Agreement shall be reported to State and Federal tax authorities. CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT shall not withhold any sums payable to KINGS VIEW on account of tax liability, and KINGS VIEW is independently responsible for payment of all applicable employment related taxes.
16. That the terms of this Agreement shall continue up to June 30, 2017. However, either party may terminate this Agreement by giving the other party at least thirty (30) days written notice.

- Gender Identify Disorders
- Eating Disorders
- Impulse-Control Disorders Not Elsewhere Classified
- Adjustment Disorders
- Personality Disorders, excluding Antisocial Personality Disorder
- Medication-Induced Movement Disorders (related to other Included diagnoses).

B. Impairment Criteria

Must have *one* of the following as a result of the mental disorder(s) identified in the diagnostic ("A") criteria; Must have *one*, 1, 2 *or* 3:

- 1 A significant impairment in an important area of life functioning, *or*
- 2 A probability of significant deterioration in an important area of life functioning, *or*
- 3 Children also qualify if there is a probability the child will not progress developmentally as individually appropriate.

Children covered under EPSDT qualify if they have a mental disorder which can be corrected or ameliorated (current DHS EPSDT regulations also apply).

- Delirium, Dementia, and Amnesic and Other Cognitive Disorders
- Mental Disorders Due to a General Medical Condition
- Substance-Related Disorders
- Sexual Dysfunctions
- Sleep Disorders
- Antisocial Personality Disorder
- Other Conditions that may be a focus of clinical attention, except Medication induced Movement Disorders which are included.

A beneficiary may receive services for an included diagnosis when an excluded diagnosis is also present.

C. Intervention Related Criteria

Must have *all*, 1, 2 *and* 3 below:

- 1 The focus of proposed intervention is to address the condition identified in impairment criteria "B" above *and*
- 2 It is expected the beneficiary will benefit from the proposed intervention by significantly diminishing the impairment, or preventing significant deterioration in an important area of life functioning, and /or for children it is probable the child will progress developmentally as individually appropriate (or if covered by EPSDT can be corrected or ameliorated), *and*
- 3 The condition would not be responsive to physical health care based treatment.

EPSDT beneficiaries with an included diagnosis and a substance related disorder may receive specialty mental health services directed at the substance use component. The intervention must be consistent with, and necessary to the attainment of, the specialty MH treatment goals.

CONTRACT FOR SERVICES

This Agreement is entered into effective August 1, 2016 between the **CENTRAL UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT**, hereinafter referred to as “**CENTRAL**” and Cheryl Mueller Wahl, hereinafter referred to as “**Contractor**.”

CENTRAL and Contractor agree as follows:

1. **Term of Contract.** This Contract shall become effective on August 1, 2016 and shall continue in effect through June 9, 2017 unless otherwise terminated in accordance with the terms of this Contract.
2. **Independent Contractor Status.** It is the express intention of the parties that Contractor is an independent contractor and **NOT** an employee, agent, joint venture or partner of CENTRAL. Nothing in this Contract shall be interpreted or construed as creating or establishing the relationship of employer and employee between CENTRAL and Contractor or any employee or agent of Contractor. Both parties acknowledge that Contractor is not an employee for state or federal tax purposes. Contractor shall retain the right to perform services for others during the term of this Contract.
3. **Services To Be Performed By Contractor.** Contractor shall perform the following services as part of this Contract:

Instructional Consultant

Contractor shall determine the method, details and means of performing the above-described services. CENTRAL shall have no right to, and shall not, control the manner or determine the method of accomplishing Contractor's services.

Contractor may, at the Contractor's own expense, employ such assistants as Contractor deems necessary to perform the services required of Contractor by this Contract. CENTRAL shall not control, direct, or supervise Contractor's assistants or employees in the performance of these services. Contractor assumes sole responsibility for the payment of all compensation and expenses of these assistants/employees and for all state and federal income tax, unemployment insurance, social security, disability insurance, and other mandatory withholdings.

Contractor shall perform the services required by this Contract at any place or location and at such times as Contractor shall determine.

4. **Compensation of Contractor.** In consideration for the services to be performed by Contractor, CENTRAL shall pay to Contractor:

**\$300 per day for 120 days (25 days per site, 20 days of preparation)
or \$36,000**

5. **Expenses.** Unless otherwise provided in this Contract, Contractor shall be responsible for all costs and expenses incident to the performance of services for

CENTRAL including, but not limited to, all costs of equipment provided by Contractor, all fees, fines, licenses, bonds, or taxes required of or imposed against Contractor, and all other costs of doing business.

Exceptions: **Not applicable**

6. **Billing and Payment.**

Contractor shall be paid as follows:

\$18,000 on November 15, 2016

\$18,000 on February 15, 2017

7. **Indemnification.** Contractor shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend the Central Union School District, its officers, agents, employees and members of the Central Union School District Board, from and against any and all claims, demands, suits, penalties, losses, fines, judgments, liability, causes of action, and expenses, including attorneys fees and costs, whether in contract, tort or strict liability arising out of or made necessary by Contractor's negligence, breach of any term of this Contract, or any act or omission of Contractor, its officers, agents, or employees.

8. **Termination.**

--**Without Cause** – Either party may terminate this Contract without cause upon the giving of at least thirty (30) days advance written notice of such termination to the other party.

--**Breach of Contract** – Either CENTRAL or Contractor may immediately suspend or terminate this Contract in whole or in part where, in the determination of either party, there is:

- An illegal or improper use of funds;
- A failure to comply with any term of this Contract; or
- A substantially incorrect or incomplete report has been submitted.

The aggrieved party shall give written notice of such termination to the breaching party. In no event shall continued provision of services by Contractor constitute a waiver by CENTRAL of any breach of this Contract or any default that may then exist on the part of Contractor. Neither shall continued provision of services by Contractor impair or prejudice any remedy available to CENTRAL with respect to the breach or default.

9. **Fingerprinting/TB Clearance.** Contractor expressly acknowledges and certifies that all of its employees, who work at a school site or provide pupil transportation, as listed in Education Code sections 45125.1 and 45125.2, do not have and will not have a record of conviction of any "violent felony," as listed in Penal Code section 667.5(c), or "serious felony," as listed in Penal Code section 1192.7(c) or "sex offense," as defined in Education Code section 44010, or "controlled substance offense," as defined in Education Code section 44011.

Contractor further understands and agrees that all such personnel must submit or have submitted fingerprints in the manner required by the Department of Justice together with the requisite fee as provided in Education Code section 45125.1. Contractor shall not permit any employee to come into contact with any students until the Department of Justice has ascertained that the employee has not been convicted of a violent felony, serious felony, sex offense or controlled substance offense.

Contractor further certifies that, pursuant to the provisions of Education Code section 49406, all employees, who work at a school site or provide pupil transportation, are free from active tuberculosis.

10. **Notices.** Any notice under this Contract shall be in writing, and any written notice or other document shall be deemed to have been duly given on the date of personal service on the parties or on the second business day after mailing if the document is mailed by registered or certified mail, addressed to the parties at the addresses set forth below, or to the most recent address specified by the addressee through written notice under this provision. Failure to conform to the requirement that mailings be done by registered or certified mail shall not defeat the effectiveness of notice actually received by the addressee.

11. **Entire Agreement.** This Contract supersedes any and all other contracts either oral or in writing between CENTRAL and Contractor with respect to the subject of this Contract. This Contract contains all the covenants and agreements between the parties with respect to the subject matter of this Contract and each party to this Contract acknowledges that no representations, inducements, promises or agreements have been made by or made on behalf of any party except those covenants and agreements embodied in this Contract. No agreement, statement or promise not contained in this Contract shall be valid or binding.
12. **Partial Invalidity.** If any provision in this Contract is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force without being impaired or invalidated in any way.
13. **Governing Law.** The validity of this Contract and of any of its terms and provisions, as well as the rights and duties of the parties under this Contract, shall be construed pursuant to and in accordance with California law with venue lying in the County of Kings, California.
14. **General Interpretation.** The terms of this Contract have been negotiated by the parties hereto and the language used in this Contract shall be deemed to be the language chosen by the parties hereto to express their mutual intent. This Contract shall be construed without regard to any presumption or rule requiring construction against the party causing such instrument or any portion thereof to be drafted or in favor of the party receiving a particular benefit under this Contract.

15. **Amendment.** The provisions of this Contract may be modified only by mutual agreement of the parties. No modification shall be binding unless it is in writing and signed by the party against whom enforcement of the modification is sought.
16. **Assignment.** Neither party may assign any rights or benefits or delegate any duties under this Contract without the written consent of the other party or parties. Any purported assignment without written consent shall be void.
17. **Waiver.** The party entitled to the benefit of the term or condition may waive any of the terms or conditions of this Contract at any time, but no such waiver shall affect or impair the right of the waiving party to require observance, performance or satisfaction either of that term or condition as it applies on a subsequent occasion.
18. **Attorneys Fees.** Should any litigation be commenced between the parties concerning this Contract or the rights or duties of either party in relation thereto, the party prevailing in such litigation shall be entitled, in addition to such other relief as may be granted in the litigation, to a reasonable sum as and for its attorneys fees in the litigation which shall be determined by the court in such action or in a separate action brought for that purpose.
19. **Confidentiality of Student Records.** As an independent contractor, you are at all times required to treat every student record and the contents contained therein in a confidential and professional manner. Student records may only be disclosed to or discussed with individuals who are authorized to have access to student records. Your agency will protect student records and is liable for any breach of student confidentiality or privacy of actions of its organization, employees, or contractors.

**Uniform Complaint Procedures
Community Relations**

Except as the Governing Board may otherwise specifically provide in other Board policies, these uniform complaint procedures (UCP) shall be used only to investigate and resolve only the complaints specified in BP 1312.3 complaints alleging violations of federal or state laws or regulations governing specific educational programs, the prohibition against requiring students to pay fees, deposits, or other charges for participating in educational activities, and unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, as specified in accompanying Board policy.

(cf. 1312.2 - Complaints Concerning Instructional Materials)
(cf. 1312.4 - Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures)
(cf. 4030 – Nondiscrimination in Employment)

The district's uniform complaint procedures policy and administrative regulation shall be posted in all district schools and offices, including staff lounges and student government meeting rooms. If 15 percent or more of students enrolled in a particular district school speak a single primary language other than English, the district's policy, regulation, forms, and notices concerning uniform complaint procedures shall be translated into that language. (Education Code 234.1, 48985)

The district designates the individual(s) identified below as the employee(s) responsible for coordinating the district's response to complaints and for complying with state and federal civil rights laws. The individual(s) also serve as the compliance officer(s) specified in AR 5145.3 - Nondiscrimination/Harassment as the responsible employee to handle complaints regarding sex discrimination. The individual(s) shall receive and coordinate the investigation of complaints and shall ensure district compliance with law.

The compliance officer who receives a complaint may assign another compliance officer to investigate and resolve the complaint. The compliance officer shall promptly notify the complainant if another compliance officer is assigned to the complaint.

In no instance shall a compliance officer be assigned to a complaint in which he/she has a bias or conflict of interest that would prohibit him/her from fairly investigating or resolving the complaint. Any complaint against or implicating a compliance officer may be filed with the Superintendent or designee.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that employees assigned to investigate and resolve complaints receive training and are knowledgeable about the laws and programs at issue in the complaints to which they are assigned. Training provided to such employees shall include current state and federal laws and regulations governing the program, applicable processes for investigating and resolving complaints, including those involving alleged unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), applicable standards for reaching decisions on complaints, and appropriate corrective measures. Assigned employees may have access to legal counsel as determined by the Superintendent or designee.

(cf. 4331 - Staff Development)

The compliance officer or, if necessary, any appropriate administrator shall determine whether interim measures are necessary during and pending the result of an investigation. If interim measures are determined to be necessary, the compliance officer or the administrator shall consult with the Superintendent, the Superintendent's designee, or, if appropriate, the site principal to implement, if possible, one or more interim measures. The interim measures may remain in place until the compliance officer determines that they are no longer necessary or until the district issues its final written decision, whichever occurs first.

Notifications

The district's UCP policy and administrative regulation shall be posted in all district schools and offices, including staff lounges and student government meeting rooms. (Education Code 234.1)

The Superintendent or designee shall annually provide written notification of the district's UCP, including information regarding unlawful student fees, local control and accountability plan (LCAP) requirements, and requirements related to the educational rights of foster youth and homeless students, to students, employees, parents/guardians, the district advisory committee, school advisory committees, appropriate private school officials or representatives, and other interested parties. (Education Code 262.3, 48853, 48853.5, 49013, 49069.5, 51225.1, 51225.2, 52075; 49013; 5 CCR 4622)

(cf. 0420 - School Plans/Site Councils)
(cf. 0460 - Local Control and Accountability Plan)
(cf. 1220 - Citizen Advisory Committees)
(cf. 5145.6 - Parental Notifications)
(cf. 6173 - Education for Homeless Children)
(cf. 6173.1 - Education for Foster Youth)

The annual notification and complete contact information of the compliance officer(s) may be posted on the district web site and, if available, provided through district-supported social media.

(cf. 1113 - District and School Web Sites)
(cf. 1114 - District-Sponsored Social Media)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all students and parents/guardians, including students and parents/guardians with limited English proficiency, have access to the relevant information provided in the district's policy, regulation, forms, and notices concerning the UCP.

If 15 percent or more of students enrolled in a particular district school speak a single primary language other than English, the district's policy, regulation, forms, and notices concerning the UCP shall be translated into that language, in accordance with Education Code 234.1 and 48985. In all other instances, the district shall ensure meaningful access to all relevant UCP information for parents/guardians with limited English proficiency.

The notice shall:

1. Identify the person(s), position(s), or unit(s) responsible for receiving complaints
2. Advise the complainant of any civil law remedies that may be available to him/her under state or federal antidiscrimination laws, if applicable
3. Advise the complainant of the appeal process, including, if applicable, the

complainant's right to take a complaint directly to the California Department of Education (CDE) or to pursue remedies before civil courts or other public agencies, such as the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) in cases involving unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying).

4. Include statements that:
 - a. The district has the primary responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs.
 - b. The complaint review shall be completed within 60 calendar days from the date of receipt of the complaint unless the complainant agrees in writing to an extension of the timeline.
 - c. A complaint alleging retaliation or alleging unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory, harassment, intimidation, or bullying) must be filed not later than six months from the date it occurred, or six months from the date the complainant first obtained knowledge of the facts of the alleged unlawful discrimination. The time for filing may be extended for up to 90 days by the Superintendent or designee for good cause upon written request by the complainant setting forth the reasons for the extension., harassment, intimidation, or bullying.
 - d. A student enrolled in a public school shall not be required to pay a fee for his/her participation in an educational activity that constitutes an integral fundamental part of the district's educational program, including curricular and extracurricular activities.
 - e. The Board is required to adopt and annually update the LCAP in a manner that includes meaningful engagement of parents/guardians, students, and other stakeholders in the development and/or review of the LCAP.
 - f. A foster youth shall receive information about educational rights related to his/her educational placement, enrollment in and checkout from school, as well as the responsibilities of the district liaison for foster youth to ensure and facilitate these requirements and to assist the student in ensuring proper transfer of his/her credits, records, and grades when he/she transfers between schools or between the district and another district.
 - g. The complainant has a right to appeal the district's decision to the CDE

by filing a written appeal within 15 calendar days of receiving the district's decision.

- h. The appeal to the CDE must include a copy of the complaint filed with the district and a copy of the district's decision.
- i. Copies of the district's UCP are available free of charge.

District Responsibilities

All UCP-related complaints shall be investigated and resolved within 60 calendar days of the district's receipt of the complaint unless the complainant agrees in writing to an extension of the timeline. (5 CCR 4631)

The compliance officer shall maintain a record of each complaint and subsequent related actions, including steps taken during the investigation and all information required for compliance with 5 CCR 4631 and 4633.

All parties involved in the allegations shall be notified when a complaint is filed and when a decision or ruling is made. However, the compliance officer shall keep all complaints or allegations of retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying) confidential except when disclosure is necessary to carry out the investigation, take subsequent corrective action, conduct ongoing monitoring, or maintain the integrity of the process. (5 CCR 4630, 4964)

Filing of Complaints

The complaint shall be presented to the compliance officer who shall maintain a log of complaints received, providing each with a code number and a date stamp.

All complaints shall be filed in accordance with the following:

1. A written complaint alleging district violation of applicable state or federal law or regulations governing adult education programs, consolidated categorical aid programs, migrant education, career technical and technical education and training programs, child care and development programs, child nutrition programs, and special education programs may be filed by any individual, public agency, or organization. (5 CCR 4630)
2. A complaint alleging noncompliance with the law regarding the prohibition against requiring students to pay student fees, deposits, and charges or any requirement related to the LCAP may be filed

anonymously if the complaint provides evidence, or information leading to evidence, to support an allegation of noncompliance. A complaint about a violation of the prohibition against the charging of unlawful student fees may be filed with the principal of the school. However, any such complaint shall be filed no later than one year from the date the alleged violation occurred. (Education Code 49013, 52075; 5 CCR 4630)

3. A complaint alleging unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying) may be filed only by a person who alleges that he/she personally suffered the unlawful discrimination or by a person who believes that an individual or any specific class of individuals has been subjected to it. The complaint shall be initiated no later than six months from the date when the alleged unlawful discrimination occurred, or six months from the date when the complainant first obtained knowledge of the facts of the alleged unlawful discrimination. The time for filing may be extended for up to 90 days by the Superintendent or designee for good cause upon written request by the complainant setting forth the reasons for the extension. (5 CCR 4630)
4. When a complaint alleging unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying) is filed anonymously, the compliance officer shall pursue an investigation or other response as appropriate, depending on the specificity and reliability of the information provided and the seriousness of the allegation.
5. When the complainant or alleged victim of unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying) requests confidentiality, the compliance officer shall inform him/her that the request may limit the district's ability to investigate the conduct or take other necessary action. When honoring a request for confidentiality, the district shall nevertheless take all reasonable steps to investigate and resolve/respond to the complaint consistent with the request.
6. If a complainant is unable to put a complaint in writing due to conditions such as a disability or illiteracy, district staff shall assist him/her in the filing of the complaint. (5 CCR 4600)

Mediation

Within three business days after the compliance officer receives the complaint, he/she may informally discuss with all the parties the possibility of using

mediation. Mediation shall be offered to resolve complaints that involve more than one student and no adult. However, mediation shall not be offered or used to resolve any complaint involving an allegation of sexual assault or where there is a reasonable risk that a party to the mediation would feel compelled to participate. If the parties agree to mediation, the compliance officer shall make all arrangements for this process.

Before initiating the mediation of a complaint alleging retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory, harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the compliance officer shall ensure that all parties agree to make the mediator a party to relevant confidential information. The compliance officer shall also notify all parties of the right to end the informal process at any time.

If the mediation process does not resolve the problem within the parameters of law, the compliance officer shall proceed with his/her investigation of the complaint.

The use of mediation shall not extend the district's timelines for investigating and resolving the complaint unless the complainant agrees in writing to such an extension of time. If mediation is successful and the complaint is withdrawn, then the district shall take only the actions agreed to through the mediation. If mediation is unsuccessful, the district shall then continue with subsequent steps specified in this administrative regulation.

Investigation of Complaint

Within 10 business days after the compliance officer receives the complaint, the compliance officer shall begin an investigation into the complaint.

Within one business day of initiating the investigation, the compliance officer shall provide the complainant and/or his/her representative with the opportunity to present the information contained in the complaint to the compliance officer and shall notify the complainant and/or his/her representative of the opportunity to present the compliance officer with any evidence, or information leading to evidence, to support the allegations in the complaint. Such evidence or information may be presented at any time during the investigation.

In conducting the investigation, the compliance officer shall collect all available documents and review all available records, notes, or statements related to the complaint, including any additional evidence or information received from the parties during the course of the investigation. He/she shall individually interview all available witnesses with information pertinent to the complaint, and may visit any reasonably accessible location where the relevant actions are alleged to have taken place. To investigate a complaint alleging retaliation or unlawful

discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the compliance officer shall interview the alleged victim(s), any alleged offenders, and other relevant witnesses privately, separately, and in a confidential manner. As necessary, additional staff or legal counsel may conduct or support the investigation.

A complainant's refusal to provide the district's investigator with documents or other evidence related to the allegations in the complaint, failure or refusal to cooperate in the investigation, or engagement in any other obstruction of the investigation may result in the dismissal of the complaint because of a lack of evidence to support the allegation. (5 CCR 4631)

In accordance with law, the district shall provide the investigator with access to records and other information related to the allegation in the complaint and shall not in any way obstruct the investigation. Failure or refusal of the district to cooperate in the investigation may result in a finding based on evidence collected that a violation has occurred and in the imposition of a remedy in favor of the complainant. (5 CCR 4631)

The compliance officer shall apply a "preponderance of the evidence" standard in determining the veracity of the factual allegations in a complaint. This standard is met if the allegation is more likely to be true than not.

Report of Findings

Unless extended by written agreement with the complainant, a final decision shall be sent to the complainant within 60 calendar days of the district's receipt of the complaint. Within 30 calendar days of receiving the complaint, the compliance officer shall prepare and send to the complainant a written report, as described in the section "Final Written Decision" below. If the complainant is dissatisfied with the compliance officer's decision, he/she may, within five business days, file his/her complaint in writing with the Board.

The Board may consider the matter at its next regular Board meeting or at a special Board meeting convened in order to meet the 60-day time limit within which the complaint must be answered. The Board may decide not to hear the complaint, in which case the compliance officer's decision shall be final.

If the Board hears the complaint, the compliance officer shall send the Board's decision to the complainant within 60 calendar days of the district's initial receipt of the complaint or within the time period that has been specified in a written agreement with the complainant. (5 CCR 4631)

Final Written Decision

The district's decision on how it will resolve the complaint shall be in writing and shall be sent to the complainant. (5 CCR 4631)

In consultation with district legal counsel, information about the relevant part of a decision may be communicated to a victim who is not the complainant and to other parties who may be involved in implementing the decision or are affected by the complaint, as long as the privacy of the parties is protected.

If the complaint involves a limited-English-proficient student or parent/guardian and the student involved attends a school at which 15 percent or more of the students speak a single primary language other than English, then the decision shall also be translated into that language. In all other instances, the district shall ensure meaningful access to all relevant information for parents/guardians with limited English proficiency.

For all complaints, the decision shall include: (5 CCR 4631)

1. The findings of fact based on the evidence gathered. In reaching a factual determination, the following factors may be taken into account:
 - a. Statements made by any witnesses
 - b. The relative credibility of the individuals involved
 - c. How the complaining individual reacted to the incident
 - d. Any documentary or other evidence relating to the alleged conduct
 - e. Past instances of similar conduct by any alleged offenders
 - f. Past false allegations made by the complainant
2. The conclusion(s) of law
3. Disposition of the complaint
4. Rationale for such disposition

For complaints of retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the disposition of the complaint shall include a determination for each allegation as to whether retaliation or unlawful discrimination has occurred.

The determination of whether a hostile environment exists may involve consideration of the following:

- a. How the misconduct affected one or more students' education
 - b. The type, frequency, and duration of the misconduct
 - c. The relationship between the alleged victim(s) and offender(s)
 - d. The number of persons engaged in the conduct and at whom the conduct was directed
 - e. The size of the school, location of the incidents, and context in which they occurred
 - f. Other incidents at the school involving different individuals
5. Corrective action(s), including any actions that have been taken or will be taken to address the allegations in the complaint and including, with respect to a student fees complaint, a remedy that comports with Education Code 49013 and 5 CCR 4600

For complaints of unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the decision may, as required by law, include:

- a. The corrective actions imposed on the individual found to have engaged in the conduct that relate directly to the subject of the complaint
 - b. Individual remedies offered or provided to the complainant or another person who was the subject of the complaint
 - c. Systemic measures the school has taken to eliminate a hostile environment and prevent recurrence
6. Notice of the complainant's right to appeal the district's decision to the CDE within 15 calendar days, and procedures to be followed for initiating such an appeal

The decision may also include follow-up procedures to prevent recurrence or retaliation and for reporting any subsequent problems.

For complaints alleging unlawful discrimination based on state law (such as

discriminatory harassment, intimidation, and bullying), the decision shall also include a notice to the complainant that:

1. He/she may pursue available civil law remedies outside of the district's complaint procedures, including seeking assistance from mediation centers or public/private interest attorneys, 60 calendar days after the filing of an appeal with the CDE. (Education Code 262.3)
2. The 60 days moratorium does not apply to complaints seeking injunctive relief in state courts or to discrimination complaints based on federal law. (Education Code 262.3)
3. Complaints alleging discrimination based on race, color, national origin, sex, gender, disability, or age may also be filed with the U.S. Department of Education, Office for Civil Rights at www.ed.gov/ocr within 180 days of the alleged discrimination.

Corrective Actions

When a complaint is found to have merit, the compliance officer shall adopt any appropriate corrective action permitted by law. Appropriate corrective actions that focus on the larger school or district environment may include, but are not limited to, actions to reinforce district policies; training for faculty, staff, and students; updates to school policies; or school climate surveys.

For complaints involving retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), appropriate corrective actions that focus on the victim may include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Counseling
2. Academic support
3. Health services
4. Assignment of an escort to allow the victim to move safely about campus
5. Information regarding available resources and how to report similar incidents or retaliation
6. Separation of the victim from any other individuals involved, provided the separation does not penalize the victim

7. Restorative justice
8. Follow-up inquiries to ensure that the conduct has stopped and there has been no retaliation
9. Determination of whether any past actions of the victim that resulted in discipline were related to the treatment the victim received and described in the complaint

For complaints involving retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), appropriate corrective actions that focus on a student offender may include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Transfer from a class or school as permitted by law
2. Parent/guardian conference
3. Education regarding the impact of the conduct on others
4. Positive behavior support
5. Referral to a student success team
6. Denial of participation in extracurricular or co-curricular activities or other privileges as permitted by law
7. Disciplinary action, such as suspension or expulsion, as permitted by law

The district may also consider training and other interventions for the larger school community to ensure that students, staff, and parents/guardians understand the types of behavior that constitute unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), that the district does not tolerate it, and how to report and respond to it.

If a complaint alleging noncompliance with the laws regarding student fees, deposits, and other charges, physical education instructional minutes for students in elementary schools, or any requirement related to the LCAP is found to have merit, the district shall provide a remedy to all affected students and parents/guardians subject to procedures established by regulation of the State Board of Education. (Education Code 49013, 51223, 52075)

For complaints alleging noncompliance with the laws regarding student fees, the district shall attempt in good faith, by engaging in reasonable efforts, to identify and fully reimburse all affected students and parents/guardians who paid the unlawful student fees within one year prior to the filing of the complaint. (Education Code 49013; 5 CCR 4600)

Appeals to the California Department of Education

Any complainant who is dissatisfied with the district's final written decision may file an appeal in writing with the CDE within 15 calendar days of receiving the district's decision. (Education Code 222, 48853, 48853.5, 49013, 49069.5, 51223, 51225.1, 51225.2, 51228.3, 52075; 5 CCR 4632)

The complainant shall specify the basis for the appeal of the decision and whether the facts are incorrect and/or the law has been misapplied. The appeal shall be accompanied by a copy of the locally filed complaint and a copy of the district's decision. (5 CCR 4632)

Upon notification by the CDE that the complainant has appealed the district's decision, the Superintendent or designee shall forward the following documents to the CDE: (5 CCR 4633)

1. A copy of the original complaint
2. A copy of the written decision
3. A summary of the nature and extent of the investigation conducted by the district, if not covered by the decision
4. A copy of the investigation file including, but not limited to, all notes, interviews, and documents submitted by the parties and gathered by the investigator
5. A report of any action taken to resolve the complaint
6. A copy of the district's uniform complaint procedures
7. Other relevant information requested by the CDE

**Uniform Complaint Procedures
Community Relations**

The Governing Board recognizes that the district has the primary responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The Board encourages the early, informal resolution of complaints whenever possible and appropriate. To resolve complaints which cannot be resolved through such informal process, the Board adopts the uniform system of complaint processes specified in 5 CCR 4600-4670 and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The district's uniform complaint procedures (UCP) shall be used to investigate and resolve the following complaints:

1. Any complaint alleging district violation of applicable state or federal law or regulations governing adult education programs, consolidated categorical aid programs, migrant education, career technical and technical education and training programs, child care and development programs, child nutrition programs, and special education programs (5 CCR 4610)

(cf. 3555 - Nutrition Program Compliance)

(cf. 5141.4 - Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting)

(cf. 5148 - Child Care and Development)

2. Any complaint alleging the occurrence of unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying) against any person in district programs and activities, including, but not limited to, those programs or activities funded directly by or that receive or benefit from any state financial assistance, based on the person's actual or perceived characteristics of race or ethnicity, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic

information, or any other characteristic identified in Education Code 200 or 220, Government Code 11135, or Penal Code 422.55, or based on his/her association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics (5 CCR 4610)

4. Any complaint alleging district noncompliance with legal requirements related to the implementation of the local control and accountability plan (Education Code 52075)

Any complaint, by or on behalf of any student who is a foster youth, alleging district noncompliance with any legal requirement applicable to the student regarding placement decisions, the responsibilities of the district's educational liaison to the student, the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or district, school transfer, or the grant of an exemption from Board-imposed graduation requirements (Education Code 48853, 48853.5, 49069.5, 51225.1, 51225.2)

(cf. 6173.1 - Education for Foster Youth)

6. Any complaint, by or on behalf of a homeless student as defined in 42 USC 11434a, alleging district noncompliance with any requirement applicable to the student regarding the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or district or the grant of an exemption from Board-imposed graduation requirements (Education Code 51225.1, 51225.2)

7. Any complaint alleging district noncompliance with the physical

education instructional minutes requirement for students in elementary school (Education Code 51210, 51223)

8. Any complaint alleging retaliation against a complainant or other participant in the complaint process or anyone who has acted to uncover or report a violation subject to this policy
9. Any other complaint as specified in a district policy

The Board recognizes that alternative dispute resolution (ADR) can, depending on the nature of the allegations, offer a process to reach a resolution to the complaint that is acceptable to all parties. ADR such as mediation may be offered to resolve complaints that involve more than one student and no adult. However, mediation shall not be offered or used to resolve any complaint involving sexual assault or where there is a reasonable risk that a party to the mediation would feel compelled to participate. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the use of ADR is consistent with state and federal laws and regulations.

The district shall protect all complainants from retaliation. In investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved shall be protected as required by law. As appropriate for any complaint alleging retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the Superintendent or designee shall keep confidential the identity of the complainant and/or the subject of the complaint if he/she is different from the complainant, as long as the integrity of the complaint process is maintained.

When an allegation that is not subject to the UCP is included in a UCP complaint, the district shall refer the non-UCP allegation to the appropriate staff or agency and shall investigate and, if appropriate, resolve the UCP-related allegation(s) through the district's UCP.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to district staff to ensure awareness and knowledge of current law and related requirements, including the steps and timelines specified in this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records of all UCP complaints and the investigations of those complaints. All such records shall be destroyed in accordance with applicable state law and district policy.

Non-UCP Complaints

The following complaints shall not be subject to the district's UCP but shall be referred to the specified agency: (5 CCR 4611)

1. Any complaint alleging child abuse or neglect shall be referred to the County Department of Social Services, the County Protective Services Division, and the appropriate law enforcement agency.
2. Any complaint alleging health and safety violations by a child development program shall, for licensed facilities, be referred to Department of Social Services and shall, for licensing-exempt facilities, be referred to the appropriate Child Development regional administrator.
3. Any complaint alleging employment discrimination shall be sent to the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing and the compliance officer shall notify the complainant by first class mail of the transfer.
4. Any complaint alleging fraud shall be referred to the California Department of Education.

In addition, the district's Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures, AR 1312.4, shall be used to investigate and resolve any complaint related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials, emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health or safety of students or staff, or teacher vacancies and misassignments. (Education Code 35186)

Applications

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's application form for free and reduced-price meals and related materials include the statements specified in Education Code 49557 and 7 CFR 245.5. The district's application packet shall include the notifications and information listed in Education Code 49557.2.

(cf. 3551 - Food Service Operations/Cafeteria Fund)
(cf. 3552 - Summer Meal Program)

The application form and related information shall be distributed in paper form to all parents/guardians at the beginning of each school year and shall be available to students at all times during the school day. (Education Code 48980, 49520; 42 USC 1758; 7 CFR 245.5)

In addition, the district application form for free and reduced price meals may be available online. The online application form shall require completion of only those questions necessary for determining eligibility, contain clear instructions for families that are homeless or migrant, and comply with other requirements specified in Education Code 49557.

An application form and related information shall also be provided whenever a new student is enrolled.

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall send a public release, containing the same information supplied to parents/guardians and including eligibility criteria, to local media, the local unemployment office, and any major employers in the district attendance area contemplating large layoffs. Copies of the public release shall be made available upon request to any interested person. (7 CFR 245.5)

Eligibility

The Superintendent or designee shall determine students' eligibility for the free and reduced-price meals program based on the criteria specified in 42 USC 1758 and 1773 and 7 CFR 245.1-245.13 and made available by the California Department of Education.

When authorized by law, participants in other federal or state programs may be directly certified, without further application, for enrollment in the free and reduced-price meals program. (Education Code 49561; 42 USC 1758)

Verification of Eligibility

Not later than November 15 of each year, the Superintendent or designee shall verify the eligibility of a sample of household applications approved for the school year in accordance with the sample sizes and procedures specified in 42 USC 1758 and 7 CFR 245.6a. (42 USC 1758; 7 CFR 245.6a)

If the review indicates that the initial eligibility determination is correct, the Superintendent or designee shall verify the approved household application. If the review indicates that the initial eligibility determination is incorrect, the Superintendent or designee shall: (42 USC 1758; 7 CFR 245.6a)

1. If the eligibility status changes from reduced price to free, make the increased benefits immediately available and notify the household of the change in benefits
2. If the eligibility status changes from free to reduced price, first verify the application, then notify the household of the correct eligibility status, and, when required by law, send a notice of adverse action as described below
3. If the eligibility status changes from free or reduced price to paid, send the household a notice of adverse action as described below

If any household is to receive a reduction or termination of benefits as a result of verification activities, or if the household fails to cooperate with verification efforts, the Superintendent or designee shall reduce or terminate benefits, as applicable, and shall properly document and retain on file in the district the reasons for ineligibility. He/she also shall send a notice of adverse action to any household

that is to receive a reduction or termination of benefits. Such notice shall be provided 10 days prior to the actual reduction or termination of benefits. The notice shall advise the household of: (7 CFR 245.6a)

1. The change and the reasons for the change
2. The right to appeal, when the appeal must be filed to ensure continued benefits while awaiting a hearing and decision, and instructions on how to appeal
3. The right to reapply at any time during the school year

Confidentiality/Release of Records

The Superintendent designates the following district employee(s) to use individual records pertaining to student participation in the free and reduced-price meals program for the purpose of disaggregation of academic achievement data or for the identification of students who are eligible for alternative supports in a Title I program improvement school:

- Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources and Educational Services
- Coordinator(s) of Curriculum and Instruction

In using the records for such purposes, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that: (Education Code 49558)

1. No individual indicators of participation in the free and reduced-price meals program are maintained in the permanent records of any student if not otherwise allowed by law.

2. Information regarding individual student participation in the free and reduced-price meals program is not publicly released.

(cf. 4119.23/4219.23/4319.23 - Unauthorized Release of Confidential/Privileged Information)

3. All other confidentiality provisions required by law are met.
4. Information collected regarding individual students certified to participate in the free and reduced-price meals program is destroyed when no longer needed for its intended purpose.

Nondiscrimination Plan

The district's plan for students receiving free or reduced-price meals shall ensure the following: (Education Code 49557; 42 USC 1758)

1. The names of the students shall not be published, posted, or announced in any manner, or used for any purpose other than the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, unless otherwise provided by law.
2. There shall be no overt identification of any of the students by the use of special tokens or tickets or by any other means.
3. The students shall not be required to work for their meals or for milk.
4. The students shall not be required to use a separate dining area, go through a separate serving line or entrance, or consume their meals or milk at a different time.

When more than one lunch, breakfast, or type of milk is offered, the students shall have the same choice of meals or milk as is available to those students who pay the full price. (Education Code 49557; 7 CFR 245.8)

The maximum price that shall be charged to eligible students for reduced-price meals shall be 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast. (42 USC 1758, 1773)

The Governing Board recognizes that adequate nutrition is essential to the development, health, and learning of all students. The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate and encourage the participation of students from low-income families in the district's food service program.

The district shall provide at least one nutritionally adequate meal each school day, free of charge or at a reduced price, for students whose families meet federal eligibility criteria. (Education Code 49550, 49552)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that meals provided through the free and reduced-price meals program meet applicable state and/or federal nutritional standards in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Schools participating in the Special Milk Program pursuant to 42 USC 1772 shall provide milk at no charge to students who meet federal eligibility criteria for free or reduced-price meals.

The Board shall approve, and shall submit to the California Department of Education for approval, a plan that ensures that students eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals and milk are not treated differently from other students. (Education Code 49557)

Confidentiality/Release of Records

All applications and records related to eligibility for the free and reduced-price meals program shall be confidential and may not be released except as provided by law and authorized by the Board or pursuant to a court order. (Education Code 49558)

The Board authorizes designated employees to use individual records pertaining to student eligibility for the free and reduced-price meals program for the following purposes: (Education Code 49558)

1. Disaggregation of academic achievement data

2. Identification of students eligible for alternative supports in any school identified as a Title I program improvement school

If a student transfers from the district to another district, charter school, county office of education program, or private school, the Superintendent or designee may share the student's meal eligibility information to the other educational agency to assist in the continuation of the student's meal benefits.

The Superintendent or designee may release the name and eligibility status of a student participating in the free or reduced-price meal program to another school district, charter school, or county office of education that is serving a student living in the same household for purposes related to program eligibility and data used in local control funding formula calculations. (Education Code 49558)

The Superintendent or designee may release the name and eligibility status of a student participating in the free or reduced-price meal program to the Superintendent of Public Instruction for purposes of determining allocations under the local control funding formula and for assessing accountability of that funding. (Education Code 49558)

The Superintendent or designee may release information on the school lunch

program application to the local agency that determines eligibility for participation in the Medi-Cal program if the student has been approved for free meals or, if included in the agreement with the local agency, for reduced-price meals. He/she also may release information on the school lunch application to the local agency that determines eligibility for CalFresh or another nutrition assistance program authorized under 7 CFR 210.1 if the student has been approved for free or reduced-price meals. Information may be released for these purposes only if the student's parent/guardian consents to the sharing of information and the district has entered into a memorandum of understanding with the local agency which, at a minimum, includes the roles and responsibilities of the district and local agency and the process for sharing the information. After sharing information with the local agency for purposes of determining eligibility for that program, no further information shall be shared unless otherwise authorized by law. (Education Code 49557.2, 49557.3, 49558)

Teacher Qualifications Under The No Child Left Behind Act

Definitions

Core academic subjects include English, reading or language arts, mathematics, science, foreign languages, civics and government, economics, arts, history, and geography. *(20 USC 7801)*

High Objective Uniform State Standard Evaluation (*HOUSSE*) is a method of determining a teacher's subject matter competence using forms developed by the California Department of Education (*CDE*). *HOUSSE* Part 1 consists of a summation of the teacher's years of experience, coursework, professional development, and service to the profession. *HOUSSE* Part 2, to be conducted only if Part 1 does not indicate subject matter competency, consists of direct observation and portfolio assessment and, if necessary, completion of the Peer Assistance and Review Program for Teachers or other individualized professional development plan. *(5 CCR 6104)*

Policy Obsolete - Delete

Teacher from an accredited institution of higher education and received a credential, or was enrolled in or had completed an approved intern program, on or after July 1, 2002. *(5 CCR 6100)*

Teacher not new to the profession is a teacher who either graduated from an accredited institution of higher education and received a credential, or was enrolled in or had completed an approved intern program, before July 1, 2002. *(5 CCR 6100)*

Teacher Qualifications

To meet the teacher qualification requirements of the federal No Child Left Behind Act (*NCLB*), a teacher of a core academic subject shall meet all of the following conditions: *(20 USC 6319, 7801; 34 CFR 200.55, 200.56, 300.18; 5 CCR 6101, 6104, 6105, 6110)*

1. Hold a bachelor's degree
2. Hold a full credential or be currently enrolled in an approved intern program for less than three years

(cf. 4112.2 - Certification)

(cf. 4112.21 - Interns)

3. Demonstrate subject matter competency in accordance with the applicable requirements below

(cf. 6171 - Title I Programs)

A teacher who holds a supplementary authorization or is employed on a local teaching assignment shall meet the teacher qualification requirements of NCLB if he/she holds a California teaching credential and has demonstrated subject matter competency for the grade span and subject matter taught. *(5 CCR 6116)*

A teacher shall not meet the teacher qualification requirements of NCLB if he/she is teaching with a short-term staff permit, a provisional internship permit, or a state or local waiver for the grade or subject taught. *(5 CCR 6115, 80021, 80021.1)*

Demonstration of Subject Matter Competency

Subject matter competency shall be demonstrated in accordance with the following requirements based on the grade levels taught and the teacher's length of time in the profession:

1. An elementary teacher who is new to the profession shall pass a validated statewide subject matter examination certified by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC). *(5 CCR 6102)*
2. An elementary teacher who is not new to the profession shall complete one of the following:

 - b. The HOUSSE, as defined above, to determine the teacher's subject matter competency in each of the core academic subjects taught by the teacher
3. A middle or high school teacher who is new to the profession shall pass or complete one of the following for every core academic subject currently assigned: *(5 CCR 6111)*
 - a. A validated statewide subject matter examination certified by the CTC
 - b. University subject matter program approved by the CTC
 - c. Undergraduate major in the subject taught
 - d. Graduate degree in the subject taught
 - e. Coursework equivalent to the undergraduate major
4. A middle or high school teacher who is not new to the profession shall pass or complete one of the following for every core subject assigned: *(5 CCR 6112)*
 - a. A validated statewide subject matter examination that the CTC has utilized to determine subject matter competency for credentialing purposes

- b. University subject matter program approved by the CTC
- c. Undergraduate major in the subject taught
- d. Graduate degree in the subject taught
- e. Coursework equivalent to the undergraduate major
- f. Advanced certification or credential, such as certification from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards
- g. The HOUSSE, as defined above, to determine the teacher's subject matter competency in each of the core academic subjects taught by the teacher

Policy Obsolete - Delete

- 5. An element of the HOUSSE for teachers of multiple subjects exclusively to students with disabilities may either: *(20 USC 1401; 34 CFR 300.18; 5 CCR 6111)*
 - a. Meet the requirements above for teachers who are new or not new to the profession, as applicable
 - b. In the case of a new special education teacher who has demonstrated subject matter competency in mathematics, language arts, or science, demonstrate competency in the other core academic subject(s) he/she teaches through the HOUSSE no later than two years after the date of employment

Satisfaction of Requirements Outside District

A teacher who has been determined by another District in California to have met the teacher qualification requirements for the grade level and/or subject taught shall not be required to demonstrate again that he/she meets those requirements. *(5 CCR 6120)*

A teacher who has been determined to meet subject matter competency requirements outside of California shall be considered to have met those requirements for the particular subject and/or grade span in California. The date of issuance of a valid out-of-state credential shall be used to identify a teacher as new or not new to the profession. *(5 CCR 6125)*

A teacher prepared in a country other than the United States shall be considered to have met NCLB teaching requirements if he/she: *(5 CCR 6126)*

- 1. Holds a degree from a foreign college or university that is at least equivalent to bachelor's degree offered by an American institution of higher education

2. Has completed a teacher preparation program that meets CTC requirements for out-of-country trained teachers
3. Demonstrates subject matter competency for the grade span and subjects taught through the same or equivalent processes and methods required of California teachers
4. Holds a California teaching credential

Certification of Compliance

All teachers teaching core academic subjects shall complete and sign a certificate of compliance with NCLB requirements and attach appropriate documentation. The Superintendent or designee shall verify the information and retain the signed original copy.

The principal shall attest in writing as to whether the teacher meets the requirements related to teacher qualifications. Copies of the attestation shall be maintained at the school and at the District office and shall be available to any member of the public upon request. *(20 USC 6319)*

Policy Obsolete - Delete

District Plan for Highly Qualified Teachers

Within the Title I local educational agency plan, the Superintendent or designee shall develop a plan for ensuring that all teachers of core academic subjects will meet NCLB requirements in accordance with law. As part of this plan, the Superintendent or designee shall provide high-quality professional development designed to enable teachers to meet NCLB requirements. *(20 USC 6312, 6319)*

Parental Notifications

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of each student attending a school receiving Title I funds that they may request information regarding the professional qualifications of their child's classroom teacher including, but not limited to: *(20 USC 6311)*

1. Whether the teacher has met state qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction
2. Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which state qualification or licensing criteria have been waived
3. The baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any other graduate certification or degree held by the teacher, and the field of discipline of the certification or degree

4. Whether the student is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications

(cf. 4222 - Teacher Aides/Paraprofessionals)

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall provide timely notice to individual parents/guardians of students attending a Title I school whenever their child has been assigned to or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by a teacher of a core academic subject who does not meet NCLB teacher qualification requirements. *(20 USC 6311; 34 CFR 200.61)*

The Superintendent or designee shall notify teachers, as appropriate, prior to distributing the above notice to parents/guardians.

The notice **Policy Obsolete - Delete** understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, be provided in a language that the parents/guardians can understand. *(20 USC 6311)*

Recognizing the importance of teacher effectiveness in improving student achievement, the Governing Board desires to recruit and hire teachers for core academic subjects who possess the subject matter knowledge and teaching skills required by the federal No Child Left Behind Act (*NCLB*).

The Superintendent or designee shall inform teachers of NCLB requirements and shall identify additional qualifications, if any, that individual teachers need to demonstrate in order to meet the requirements. He/she shall work with individual teachers to develop a plan for attaining full qualifications.

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor the distribution of "highly qualified" teachers among District schools and develop strategies, as needed, to encourage teachers who meet NCLB requirements to teach in schools with the lowest student performance.

California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (*Credential Explanations*)

Multiple Subject Teaching Credential

This credential authorizes the holder to teach all subjects in a self-contained class and, as a self-contained classroom teacher, to team-teach or to regroup students across classrooms, in grades twelve and below, including preschool, and in classes organized primarily for adults. In addition, this credential authorizes the holder to teach core classes consisting of two or more subjects to the same group of students in grades five through eight, and to teach any of the core subjects he or she is teaching to a single group of students in the same grade level as the core for less than fifty percent of his or her work day.

Single Subject Teaching Credential

Authorizes teaching of a specific subject in a departmentalized K-12 classroom usually found at the middle or secondary level. The holder has demonstrated the subject matter knowledge required to teach the single subject through successful completion of an approved academic program and by completion of subject matter course work or passage of multiple choice and standardized constructed response examinations.

General Credential

Originally issued under provisions of the law that existed prior to 1961. The Generals were only issued as clear credentials and were therefore considered to be one-tier credentials. These credentials are no longer issued on an initial basis but renewals are issued to the holders of General Credentials. Some were issued for the life of the holder and need not be renewed.

Standard Credentials

Originally issued under the provisions of law (Fisher Act) beginning in 1961 and available to first-time applicants until September 15, 1974 and under certain conditions until 1976. The Standards were issued under a two-tier system. Most individuals who qualified for their initial credential were issued a partial credential and, after completing additional requirements, were issued a clear (or full) credential. These credentials are no longer issued on an initial basis but renewals are issued to the holders of clear Standard Credentials. Also see Pre-Ryan Credentials.

Preliminary

Policy Obsolete - Delete

This term refers to teaching or services credentials that are valid for five years. Preliminary teaching credentials require the holder to complete a bachelor's degree, a teacher preparation program including student teaching, CBEST, subject matter competence, and additional specific requirements. Additional academic requirements must be completed to qualify for the professional clear credential. Out-of-state trained applicants may be issued a five-year preliminary credential. A preliminary credential has the same authorization as the clear or professional clear credential.

Professional Clear Teaching Credential

Document issued to individuals who qualify for either: 1) an initial Ryan Multiple or Single Subject clear basic teaching credential after August 31, 1985 and verify completion of a fifth year of study, health education, special populations, and computer education requirements, or 2) an initial SB 2042 Multiple or Single Subject clear basic teaching credential and verify completion of either an approved induction program or a fifth year of study and advanced course work in health education, special populations, and computer technology. The holder must verify completion of the professional growth requirements every five years to renew their credential.

Bilingual, Crosscultural, Language and Academic Development (*BCLAD*)

An authorization to provide specialized instruction to individuals for whom English is a second language. Specifically it authorizes instruction for 1) English Language Development (ELD) in preschool, K-12, and adults (restrictions apply to holders of Children's Center Permits, Child Development Permits, and Designated Subjects Teaching Credentials), 2) Specially Designed Academic Instruction Delivered in English (SDAIE) in the subjects and grade levels authorized by the prerequisite credential or permit, and 3) instruction for primary language development and content instruction delivered in the primary language in the subjects and grade levels authorized by the prerequisite credential or permit. The BCLAD authorization can be listed on a Single Subject or Multiple Subject Teaching Credential as an emphasis if a college or university program was completed or, if the applicant met BCLAD requirements separate from the teacher preparation program, a BCLAD Certificate may be obtained.

Crosscultural, Language and Academic Development (*CLAD*)

This credential authorizes the holder to provide the following services to limited-English-proficient pupils: (1) instruction for English language development in grades twelve and below, including preschool, and in classes organized primarily for adults; and (2) specially designed content instruction delivered in English in multiple-subject-matter (self-contained) classes, or single-subject-matter (departmentalized) courses as authorized by any supplementary authorization listed above. This crosscultural, language and academic development authorization also covers classes authorized by other valid, non-emergency credentials held, as specified in Education Code Section 44253.3.

SB 1969 (*Hughes*)

Created during the 1994 legislative session, it established an alternative route for permanent teachers to be assigned to teach English learners. Teachers who completed training in staff development and passed an assessment were issued Certificates of Completion by school districts and county offices of education. The last date a district or county could issue a Certificate of Completion was January 1, 2003. The last date to submit an SB 1969 Certificate of Completion to CCTC for registration was June 30, 2003.

SB 395 (H)

Policy Obsolete - Delete

Effective January 1, 2000, this legislation requires the Commission to issue a certificate based on the completion of staff development that authorizes the holder to teach English language development (ELD) and/or specially designed academic instruction delivered in English (SDAIE) to English learners.

Specially Designed Academic Instruction Delivered in English (*SDAIE*)

A component of a comprehensive program for English learners, consisting of a variety of strategies, techniques, and materials specially designed to provide students at an intermediate or advanced level of English proficiency access to grade-level core curriculum in English. Must be provided by a teacher who has a credential appropriate to the assignment and a CLAD Emphasis or Certificate or who is in training for such an authorization.
